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PHASE XI 135TH INFANTRY REGIMENT HISTORY

RELIEF OF REGIMENT AND REST AND TRAINING AREA AT TARQUINIA.

RESUMPTION OF THE OFFENSIVE NORTH FROM GROSSETO UP TO AND INCLUDING

THE CAPTURE OF LANHORNO AND OCCUPATION OF THE ARNO RIVER LINE.

On about the 10th of June, the 135th Infantry Regiment was moving into a "rest area" near TARQUINIA and two enjoyable weeks were spent here. The weather was fine and bivouac areas were selected on the sides of gently sloping hills over-looking the Mediterranean Coast and the busy air-fields and docks which, thanks to the rapidity of our troops advance, were already in operation. For once, fatigue was not the most critical factor in influencing the withdrawal of the 135th Infantry from the line. A certain number of replacements had to be assimilated to replace losses incurred at LANUVIO, but even more important was the job of assembling together all of the units, which during the hectic days of the chase, had become scattered. Also on the 10th of June, the 135th Infantry was relieved from its attachment to the 1st Armored Division, and rejoined the 34th Division in this area (TARQUINIA). Lt. Col. Ashton H. Manhart joined and assumed Command of the Regiment on the 10th of June before they left the Port of CIVITAVECCHIA.

On the 15th of June, the 442nd Japanese-American Infantry Regiment (less the 1st Battalion) was added to the Division. The 100th Infantry Battalion, also a Jap-American unit, was attached to the Regiment to act as its 1st Battalion, and this 442nd Regiment made a 4th Infantry Combat Team, with their own artillery, Medical Troops, and Engineers.

On the 18th of June the training program was resumed and 85 passes were issued each day to 85 men and officers for leave to ROME. Also, the nearby beach was cleared for swimming and sun bathing.

The units visited a Quartermaster clothing and bath exchange during this period. Special Teams from the 168th Infantry inspected all T/S equipment in the various organizations. Also about this time all troops were paid. On the 18th of June, after the morning Church services, the Regiment was formed for a parade. The Regimental Commander gave awards to men of the Regiment while the Assistant Division Commanding

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General, Brigadier General Harry B. Sherman, reviewed the parade. Lt. Col. Kearns returned to the 3rd Battalion on the 19th, from the hospital, to assume command.

On the 24th of June the Regiment moved forward to an assembly area near GAVORRANO, with the 1st Battalion 3 miles Southeast of GAVORRANO near Highway 1; the 2nd Battalion a little North of GAVORRANO, while the 3rd Battalion had moved South of this same town. On the next day, however, the Regiment moved by foot; the 1st Battalion moved to an area 7 miles Northeast of FOLLONICA; the 2nd Battalion marched 5 miles to an assembly area near C. VARE ALL ARANICA; the 3rd Battalion moved by foot Northwest 7000 meters. Trucks moved the entire Regiment the following day (the 26th of June); the 1st Battalion now was located 1 mile Southwest of SUVERETO, the 2nd Battalion moved to an assembly area which, like the 1st Battalions area, was housing a few snipers that had been bypassed by the advancing 442nd Infantry (Jap-American) Regimental Combat Team; the 3rd Battalion continued on Northwestward by trucks for 13 miles, where they arrived at their assembly area early in the morning of the 27th of June. All the Companies had outposted security, and patrols were sent forward primarily to keep the enemy forces from infiltrating behind the advancing 442nd Infantry, but also to keep in contact with the forward elements of the Regiment.

On the 28th, preparations were being made for the relief of the 442nd Infantry by the 2nd and 3rd Battalions. Meanwhile the 1st Battalion left its assembly area 1 mile Southwest of SUVERETO in the evening and moved by truck to the new area 1 mile North of CASTAGNETO. They traveled by truck via Highway 1 because the back-roads had not been cleared. The 2nd Battalion moved, tactically, early in the morning for the purpose of relieving the 442nd Infantry. Reconnaissance in the CASTAGNETO area was made by the Battalion Commanding Officer (Lt. Col. Simon Castillo) and 2 of his Staff-Officers. The reconnoitered area was entered on 1600 hours of that day. The 3rd Battalion moved with the same purpose as the 2nd Battalion, by truck to C. FORNACELLE, which was North approximately a mile from CASTAGNETO. The 2nd and 3rd Battalions were now within a mile of one another.

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On the following day (June 29th) the 2nd and 3rd Battalions passed through the 42nd Infantry at 0630 hours and attacked the enemy, using the FOSO DI BOLONHERI river as a line of departure. The 1st Battalion was in Reserve and followed behind the 2nd and 3rd Battalions, who met very little resistance. The movement by all the Battalions was by foot and they traveled North by way of BOLONHERI and BIBBONA. The 2nd Battalion pushed on to BOLONHERI, where they found that the PARTISANS had been harassing the enemy for the past two days. A large number of English-Speaking Italians were met in this sector. After a brief stop for lunch, the 2nd Battalion moved on toward the town of BIBBONA, meeting slight resistance. The first troops arriving at the town at 1145 hours, encountered enemy machine guns and some self-propelled fire momentarily from beyond BIBBONA. After the 2nd Battalion by-passed CASHILE on the right, it moved on toward the River, stopping for the night at POIO ARGELLINA, South of Hill Number 67.

Returning to the 3rd Battalion, we find it jumped off before daybreak but its advance was slow and the ground was difficult, being covered by thick brush. The final objective was reached just before noon, this objective being BALOLINI, ITALY. With Company "I" leading the attack, BIBBONA was taken about five o'clock that evening.

Then after the Battalion was reorganized, it passed in Reserve on the left rear of the 2nd Battalion. On the last day of the month of June, the 1st Battalion passed thru the 3rd Battalion with the 1st Battalion Command Post set up in a house at PATTALA-FABRICA. "A" Company was on the left, "B" Company on the right and "C" Company was in reserve. The 1st Battalion was 500 yards North of phase line "C", which follows the FORNICE OGGINA River. The 3rd Battalion in reserve, moved forward to an area in the vicinity of phase line "C" and established roadblocks on the left of the Regimental sector, 3 kilometers East of OGGINA, ITALY.

The 1st Battalion crossed the OGGINA River with "A" and "B" Companies abreast. "B" Company reached the objective with little resistance, while "A" Company suffered several casualties and was pinned down, but after darkness - reached their objective also.

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At 1700 hours, "C" Company moved between "A" and "B" Company; at dawn, the companies received a fierce counterattack. "A" Company received the full thrust of the attack, forcing "A" Company off their hill and killed their Company Commander, Lt. Robertson. However, "A" Company retook their objective, with the assistance of a platoon from "C" Company, shortly afterwards. Following much close hand-to-hand fighting, the counter-attack was repulsed. The 1st Battalion Com and Post caught a lot of self-propelled fire in their sector throughout this day. However, that night the 2nd Battalion, 442nd Infantry (Jap-American unit) relieved the 1st Battalion who moved back to an assembly area one half mile from CASA GIUSTRI. This movement was by foot.

The 2nd Battalion, 135th Infantry, left POMBIO-ARGELLINA, meanwhile, on this the 30th of June, and moved steadily forward but as they neared the CECINA River, they were fired upon by mortars, self-propelled guns and machine guns. Roads approaching the river through the wooded area south of CECINA (Rue La Lupa) were heavily mined, three of the Battalions vehicles being destroyed by those mines. However, the advance continued after several sharp skirmishes. In a few hours, the 2nd Battalion held the CECINA River line with approximately a 1000 yard front.

The CECINA River was not a particularly formidable barrier, consisting of a shallow stream running in a wide bed with many scattered banks of shale. A valuable enemy field order, taken from a German prisoner, disclosed that the enemy had retired to the North of the CECINA River and was going to delay our crossing for as long as possible. The German units consisted of the 16th SS Reconnaissance Battalion on the coast, while further inland was deployed the 19th German Air Force Field Division, which had under its control a certain number of Turkoman troops from the 162nd Infantry Division (which had been very severely handled during the advances of the preceding few weeks). The enemy command had become so alarmed at the way in which their units were being scattered and confused by our thrust, that they had instituted a system of "straggler patrols" in their rear areas who seized any unfortunate German man who did not seem to be doing anything, and placed him with others in a similar situation, into small groups who were then committed

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to action.

At this time, Lt. Col. Fillmore K. Mearns, Commanding Officer of the 3rd Battalion, was relieved from command by orders to proceed to the 5th Army Headquarters. "There has never been an officer in the Battalion so greatly admired and respected as he! His leaving the Battalion was a great blow. He stopped at each man on his way to the rear and said good-by. His understanding of men, his courage and frankness have been a great moral factor during his command of the Battalion". All this praise was in the minds of all in the Battalion and this sentiment was expressed in these words of Reid B. Huff, a 1st Lt, who was adjutant at that time of the 3rd Battalion.

On the following day, the 1st day of July, 1944, the 2nd and 3rd Battalions (3rd on the right) crossed the CECINA River in the face of scattered opposition. All enemy attempts to throw them back were broken up by artillery fire and the Regiment was successful in consolidating a bridgehead.

The only sector of the river that proved a bit difficult to cross was on the left of this Regiment, in front of our neighbor, the 133rd Infantry, where SS troops defending the town of CECINA (on the South bank) put up a stubborn resistance. However, the 133rd Infantry in cooperation with the 135th Infantry on its right, made a pincers attack upon the enemy, who was decisively beaten.

The country through which the advance now had to move was very difficult. A series of jagged mountains separated by deep gorges, and covered with forests and underbrush made communications very difficult and the supply of food and ammunition a matter of great exertion. The 135th Infantry, pinching out the 133rd Infantry, was now the left flank unit of the Division, the 442nd Infantry being on our right, with the 168th the right flank unit of the Division. On the 2nd day of July the 2nd Battalion, 135th Infantry forged ahead and moved beyond the river to the East-west highway which runs East into CECINA. Two Companies crossed the road, leaving one in reserve. Eight tanks were up with the troops to secure the line. The 3rd Battalion moved up to secure the left

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flank of the 2nd Battalion.

The mission was to first cut off route 68 and then turn West toward the coast, cutting off Highway 1. On July the 2nd, the attack was coordinated with that of the 3rd Battalion and the operation was carried out successfully despite enemy counter-attacks, numerous mine fields and constant anti-tank and self propelled gun fire.

Our artillery was able to find numerous profitable targets and in several instances were able to destroy well dug in, camouflaged pill boxes, and assisted immeasurably in breaking up the attempts of the enemy to counter-attack our forces.

With the fall of the enemy positions above the GECINA River, the Regiment continued the pursuit Northward along the TYRRHENIAN coast of ITALY. Many mines and incessant harassing artillery fire were encountered as the Regiment relentlessly pushed Northward after the retreating 16th "Reichsfuhrer" SS Division.

ROSIGNANO

The struggle for the capture of ROSIGNANO opened on July the 3rd with the 3rd and 1st Battalions moving forward through VADA. There was evidence that the enemy had withdrawn in haste, but prisoners were not plentiful. Enemy equipment, however, was abundant.

Initial contact with the enemy soon demonstrated that the Germans had determined to make a firm stand for the town. Small arms fire developed into numerous and intense fire fights and the enemy, with excellent observation, made much use of Self-propelled guns, artillery and mortars. The Regiment was committed to the attack on the ROSIGNANO position with the 3rd Battalion on the left and the 1st Battalion on the right. The main effort was made by the 3rd Battalion, which had the mission of capturing the town and the road leading North. After much opposition from the enemy and difficulties with terrain, the leading elements of the 3rd Battalion entered the town successfully, with tanks leading the attack. Casualties were severe and although surrounded by the enemy during the night they organized strong points and held their positions. This pressure was relieved on the morning of July the 4th, when a platoon from "L" Company pushed

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around toward the left edge of the town. By 1800 hours, the Regiment was in possession of half of the town.

The 1st Battalion attacked the hill to the east of ROSIGNANO with "A" and "C" Company in the assault. The attack was just before dawn and many of the enemy were by-passed and not realized. The assault companies reached their objective "pink house hill" shortly after dawn. At this time "B" Company moved up and ran into the by-passed Germans. A fire fight resulted during which "B" and "D" Companies inflicted heavy casualties on the surprised opposition. Company "C" was to continue the attack with one platoon; as the platoon was preparing for the attack, it was caught by artillery and mortar fire and left only two men out of the platoon uninjured. "B" Company continued the attack that night and took the next objective. The following day "C" Company attacked and took the last hill east of ROSIGNANO. The 1st Battalion, meeting such a great deal of resistance, was not able to make too much progress.

The battle for the town grew into a heavy engagement as the enemy, moving in reinforcements, regrouped and counter-attacked. These counter-attacks, while not involving large numbers, made our progress slow, with snipers being very much in evidence.

The next few days were tough and strenuous and took the form of an out-and-out slugging match between two stubborn enemy divisions and the 34th. Our troops experienced almost as much trouble in over-coming the difficulties of poor communication as they did from direct German opposition. The roads, never in very good shape, were not designed for the heavy traffic we were obliged to put over them and, furthermore, the German engineers had demolished every bridge and culvert, had caused land-slides at points where the trails ran along shelves cut into sides of hills, and had blown craters in the road at awkward hairpin bends. Much toil and much time was involved in clearing the way for our supplies to move to the forward elements.

A considerable number of civilians had remained in the town and the heavy fighting made it impossible for them to leave. Many were killed and wounded, and the partisans who had been giving our men token aid in the fighting, removed as many as possible.

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At the time of the capture of the town it was feared that an epidemic might break out as a result of the many dead littering the streets and demolished buildings, so NOSIGNANO was placed off limits to all troops, except those who were forced to remain as garrison units.

Our attacks were renewed on the 11th and by late afternoon the enemy was forced back. We captured prisoners, inflicting heavy casualties and seized some material, including artillery pieces. The Germans, with their shortage of transportation, were forced to resort to the use of oxen to pull out some of their artillery. It was also discovered that the Germans were using wooden carts brought into Italy from Russia.

On this same day, the 11th of July, Lt. General Mark W. Clark, accompanied by Major General Snyder, visited the Regimental Command Post where General Clark personally pinned the Silver Eagle on the collar of the Regimental Commander, Lt. Colonel Ashton H. Manhart, making him a full Colonel. General Clark also greeted members of the Regimental Staff.

On July 13th, the Regiment lost one of its finest officers when Captain Paul W. Blommen, Commander of the Cannon Company, was instantly killed by a mine, while on reconnaissance to displace his guns forward. Long and loyal service had been rendered by Captain Blommen to the Regiment, and many of its past successes and victories were made possible by the excellent support given by his Cannon Company.

By the 17th of July, our troops had emerged into less hilly country and it was possible to use more armored vehicles in support of the Infantry and for flank protection. We were now within striking distance of LEGHORN. Higher headquarters directed us to exert all our efforts for the capture of this place rather than pursue our original intention of first gaining control of the Arno Valley. Accordingly, the 34th Division sent every available support to the attack of the 135th Infantry, who were now slugging it out with SS troops in stubborn fighting among the hills southeast of the objective.

Following the capture of NOSIGNANO, the Regiment had continued the attack Northward with the 1st and 2nd Battalions on the line, the 3rd in reserve. The pace was slow

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because of the difficult mountainous terrain, combined with various mines, machine guns, and self-propelled gun fire offering numerous delays.

It was quite obvious that the capture of this great port was extremely important to future operations both in Italy and on the Southern coast of France. Again the Partisans gave the Regiment assistance, acting as guides. Roads were found to be in a very bad condition and the engineers were unable to keep up with the forward troops. After fighting Northward through CASTELNUOVO and to GABBRO, it was reported by civilians at the latter town that the retiring SS German troops were about 16 to 20 years of age. They had four or five pieces of artillery, four machine guns and rifles. Very few of the enemy were encountered during this period, but as the German withdrew, he left many mines throughout the area. Most of the Germans marched, having no vehicles to ride in and their clothing was worn out, making the men look shabby. Also, they had no food even though they had stolen food from the civilians. It was felt that this group was tired of the war and disorganized.

The combined efforts of the 1st and 2nd Battalions enabled the Regiment to sweep forward toward the last range of mountains circling LEONHORN. The 1st Battalion captured Mt. MACCIARE and Hill 421, two of the dominating hills in the area. The Germans launched two severe counter-attacks at these positions. Lt. Col. Phelan (Black Jack) was injured by tank fire, but the 1st Battalion continued forward, under the capable leadership of Lt. Col. Tyler (then a Major). The 3rd Battalion, being committed through the 1st and 2nd Battalions and exploiting the success of these two units, succeeded in capturing the high dominating hills to the East of LEONHORN on July the 18th and on the same day Company "J", of the Second Battalion moved into what was known as the POPAJANA-VECCHIO area where they were fired upon by the enemy. After exchanging some small arms fire, they discovered an estimated 200 of the enemy in the hills and draws in that vicinity.

Captain Alfred H. Brenlinger, Commanding Officer at this time of "H" Company and 1st Lt. Norman E. Brown of Company "E", later Capt. of 3-1, 2nd Battalion, ran to a disabled armored car and turned its machine gun and 37mm anti-tank gun against the

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Germans, while at the same time, Lt. Col. Castilla moved to a nearby house and directed artillery fire which set the brush ablaze. Many of the enemy were trapped, although few prisoners were taken.

An out post report said that ships were sighted leaving the harbor at LEGHORN, and an air mission was sent out. It was later learned that the Germans were using these ships, which had been filled with concrete, to block the harbor. Numerous explosions, probably demolitions, were heard in the vicinity of the port. A report from Corps said there were definite signs that the enemy was withdrawing to the East in our sector, and Major General Ryder expressed the hope that the Regiment would be able to occupy LEGHORN soon. Lt. General Mark W. Clark visited the Command Post at the 135th Infantry Regiment again on July the 18th and had a conference with Colonel Manhart.

After a determined spurt, our patrols arrived in the southeastern suburbs of LEGHORN on the night of the 18th and the morning of the 19th, columns of vehicles carrying War Correspondents, Engineers and many others entered at the same time as troops of the 2nd Battalion moved in with the mission of garrisoning the Southern part of the town. The troops reorganized and rested for the remainder of the day. A few enemy shells dropped into the city but caused little damage.

In order to safe-guard the prize of this great seaport, it was essential to drive back German elements South of the Arno River and to prevent enemy raiding parties from trying to penetrate to the city. Strong patrols were at once pushed forward to the river, but very few enemy were encountered and it was evident that the Germans had withdrawn the bulk of their force to the northern bank, leaving only outposts and patrols within the big loops which the ARNO made in the flat land east of PISA.

The 135th Regiment temporarily set up defensive positions along the southern bank and kept close watch on the enemy posts opposite them, including the city of PISA itself, where enemy weapons could frequently be seen shooting at us. We were unable to take adequate retaliatory action for fear of damaging priceless treasures of this ancient town.

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After a short rest of two days, the Regiment moved forward in the direction of PISA. Three bridges on Highway 1 were blown out. The roads were not mined and it was therefore possible to move organic transportation up in support of the troops. On July the 22nd, a patrol from Company "D" was sent out to the airport South of PISA and came back from the mission with a German patrol of six men captured intact. Another patrol did not meet with any resistance. The road North of the airport was secured for use as a line of departure on PISA.

No great difficulty was experienced in securing the part of the city South of the ARNO River. Enemy artillery fire was light and there was little harassing small arms fire. With few casualties, the Regiment secured the Southern banks of the ARNO River and occupied the portion of PISA South of the river.

A new heavy rocket weapon was used by the Germans at PISA. The rocket could be seen floating through the air but could not be heard. One of the rocket shells was sent to the 125th Field Artillery and it was described as about 5 inches in diameter, 20 inches long with a bulb-like nose about 3 inches round. There were two types, one type shell concussion and the other incendiary.

At about this time it was not known whether our halt would be short, so plans and reconnaissances were made to cross the ARNO in the event that we were ordered to do so. After a few days of patrolling, the 135th Infantry Regiment was relieved on the 25th of July, and began moving back to the resort town of CASTIGLIONCELLO and other villages along the coast South of LEGHORN for a period of rest. Certain advisors were left behind for a short time until the new units had settled in. The 125th Field Artillery rejoined the Regiment a little later when it was seen that their fire power for the repulse of a possible enemy attack South of the river was no longer needed. The 3rd Battalion and Cannon Company went to OSIGNANO, the 2nd Battalion into the area about SOLVAY and the Regimental Command Post in the CASTIGLIONCELLO area. The 1st Battalion remained on the line throughout the remainder of the month.

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During the static period just prior to the Regiment's relief, Major General Charles W. Hyder, who had led the 34th Division since Ireland, left for a higher command in another theater. He was succeeded on the 21st of July by Major General Charles L. Bolte. Under General Bolte's direction the 34th proceeded to train for future operations and to enjoy the unusual experience of several weeks on and out of the fighting line, during which it could enjoy the facilities offered by the Mediterranean resort coast in summer.

"D" Company fired a record amount of mortar ammunition during this period with the primary mission of eliminating enemy observation and this was fulfilled with excellent results as the German observation was kept at a minimum. Captain Regimental Ammunition Officer, stated at this time an unusual fact. "D" Company fired 19,000 rounds of 81mm shells, which was more ammunition fired by this single Company than by the entire Regiment throughout the complete AFRICAN Campaign. Three base plates were broken and 5 mortar tubes were worn out in this expenditure. 1st Lt. Herbert E. Grote, promoted to the rank of Captain a short time later, was Commanding Officer of "D" Company during this period.

The 1st Battalion remained on the line at the ARNO River in PISA for five days. While in this position, a new type of rocket fire was encountered. One round of this rocket fire hit a house, tore it down completely and killed and wounded eleven men. "D" Company's mortars and the 125th Field Artillery located and destroyed at least one of these rocket gun emplacements.

ROSIGNANO:

T/Sgt Frank W. Bilbrey, Company "C" tells of ROSIGNANO.

QUOTE:

"ROSIGNANO happened just about a year ago. I don't think we actually realized how tough a fight it was until we started counting up our casualties after it was all over. There were beausoup of them. Our Battalion didn't do much in the town itself. The 3rd Battalion had that assignment, but we kept beating our brains out for about seven days

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against some rugged hills on the flank of the town. There was a cave and tunnel on one of the hills that was about 300 yards long. Everytime we'd start snelling, the Krauts would just hole up in this tunnel and sweat it out till we were t rough. Then they'd roll out slak guns and machine guns and start getting to work on us. About the third day in that area some of the Krauts, they were no troops, pulled a phoney surrender and shot up one of our squads. Well, that got us a little more than slightly mad and started us moving. We caught a lot of counter-attacks after we chased the Krauts from their positions. We were surrounded several times but we held our ground. The interesting thing about the fighting around Volturno was the stuff everybody was bringing out of the town. Wind, silk underwear, furniture. We had a few laughs even though a lot of guys were getting hurt".

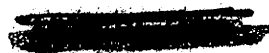
