## 66<sup>th</sup> Annual Reunion - 2013

## Range Qualification at Cp Ripley

1st Combined Arms Battalion, 194th Armor Regiment Soldiers conduct M240B Automatic Machine Gun weapon qualification at Camp Ripley Training Center during their Annual Training on June 18, 2013.

Manufactured by Fabrique Nationale, the M240B cal. 7.62 mm, was chosen by the U.S. military for different roles after large world-wide searches and competitions. The Machine gun is a belt-fed gas- operated, air-cooled, crew served, fixed headspace weapon.

The M240B is a successful and well-regarded weapon system that has proven itself in combat in Afghanistan and Iraq, serving as a powerful supplement to the lighter 5.56 mm-based M249 Machine Gun, and M4 Carbine. The 7.62 mm round provides good penetration and stopping power, a characteristic that is especially appreciated in the urban environments where many Iraqi engagements took place. Overall, the M240B's combat record must be considered superior to the problematicM60 Machine Gun that it has entirely replaced in US service. The M60 Machine replaced M1918 A3, 30 Cal Browning Machine Gun that was used during World War II and Korea.



## 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Div WWII Memorial

The 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division Association of "Red Bulls" can be proud that twenty-six years ago marked the dedication of the large granite 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division WWII Memorial at Camp Dodge, in Johnston, Iowa. The memorial was dedicated during the associations annual reunion on September 12, 1987. Those in attendance, which included Retired Div Cmdr, Maj Gen Charles Bolte, were happy to be part of the dedication which brought together close to a thousand former World War II soldiers, their families, current military and the media to mark the special day. The 34<sup>th</sup> Army Band provided the music, and a Color Guard from the 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade, the unit that carried on the lineage of the 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, was posted for the ceremony. The 194<sup>th</sup> FA provided a Firing Battery and allowed the WWII artillery veterans to fire the salute howitzers.

The success of this effort can be directly attributed to Charles Smith, A Company, 168<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment, who enlisted into the Army for World War II from North Kansas City, Missouri. PVT Charlie Smith

graduated from High school in 1940, and found himself being sent to North Africa as a filler, without even the benefit of Basic Unit Training. He was hooked up with the Des Moines boys from A Company, 168<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment, 34<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division, who gave him the nickname "Missouri." With intense "OJT" he served as a rifleman through North Africa and the early part of Italy, advancing to the rank of SGT before he came down with hepatitis. He spent months in three hospitals and later, after his recovery, was sent to do supply work in the Corps Rear area at the "Racetrack" in Naples, until the end of the war.

Charles developed the monument plans and presented a resolution to the membership at the 1985 Reunion, to build a memorial that would honor the 34<sup>th</sup> Divisions' WWII exploits and memorialize the soldiers who were killed in combat. He volunteered to be the chairman of the Memorial Committee.

The final cost of the Memorial Monument was \$14,096. The association raised more money than necessary for the actual monument so the committee made the decision to purchase two granite benches to place beside the monument for a cost of \$1,356.

Each year the Association places a wreath at the Cp Dodge Memorial as well as at National Cemeteries in North Africa and Italy, and the state veteran cemeteries in Iowa and Minnesota. Both Charles and Lawrence are now deceased.



## The 34<sup>th</sup> Div Has Unmanned Aircraft

The RQ-7 Shadow 200 is the smallest of the Shadow family of unmanned aircraft systems developed by AAI. It is in operational service with the US Army and US Marine Corps.

Shadow 200 is used to locate, recognize and identify targets up to 125km from a brigade tactical operations centre. The system recognizes tactical vehicles by day and night from an altitude of 8,000ft and at a slant range of 3.5km. Imagery and telemetry data is transmitted in near-real time from the Shadow ground control station to joint stars common ground station, all-sources analysis system and to the army field artillery targeting and direction system.

The air vehicle system can be transported by two military wheeled vehicles and can be operated round-the-clock from unprepared sites by the 22-soldier crew. The Shadow TUAS can carry payloads up to 27kg (60lb) including sensors and electronic warfare systems.

The Shadow 200 can be catapult launched from a hydraulic rail launcher. The guidance of the air vehicle can be pre-programmed before take-off or remotely controlled during the flight.

All flight training for the divisions Shadow UAV's is conducted at Camp Ripley Minnesota.



We are proud to bring back the original 'bannerhead' from volume 1 of the original Red Bulletin. The "combat newspaper" of the 34th Infantry Division was published weekly in Italy. The first issue was published on March 17. 1945, while we were on the Winter Line of the North Apennine Mountains, waiting to liberate the city of Bologna. The last issue was published on Sep 28, 1945 in Cividale while we were hoping for orders to leave the Italian-Jugoslav border for home after 44 months in World War II Europe and North Africa.

The Red Bulletin, March 17 1945, vol.1 no.1 p.3 Medical Officer's Skill, Compassion Save Life Of Wounded Nazi Soldier by T-5 Milton O. Larson, Unit Correspondent, 109th Med Bn

The German soldier was seriously wounded in fighting in the snow-covered hills south of Bologna. The aid men who brought him into a 109th Medical Battalion clearing station doubted if he would live. After plasma had been administered, it was found necessary to give him a transfusion of whole blood. Captain Archibald Fishberg asked for volunteers, blood donors. They were readily obtained.

The wounded German was in deep shock, and it was only after an hour or more of patient attention and care that he regained consciousness and asked if he was going to live.

"Yes, you're going to be alright," said the surgeon.

"Thank God  $\dots$  " sighed the German soldier.

"Don't thank YOUR God," said Captain Fishbeck, "thank a Jewish doctor."

The German prisoner of war was speechless from shock at the abrupt statement, but in his pain-filled eyes were humility and gratitude.

He would survive the war.
