34th Infantry Division Assn. Reunion

The 2013 Reunion of the 34th Infantry Division
Association will be Friday and Saturday, October 11th
& 12th, 2013 at the Johnston, Iowa Stoney Creek Inn.
This will be the 66th Reunion of the Association. Please refer to the Reunion Program Information Sheet on page 3 as well as the Registration Form on Page 7, of this newsletter. This is the only mailing for the event.

The Des Moines Chapter will host the Reunion at the Stoney Creek Inn, which is the same hotel as last two years. A special effort is being made to include recent combat veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan deployments of the 1st BCT, the 2nd BCT and the deployment of the 34th Inf Div HQ's.

Current Des Moines Chapter President, Col (Ret) Curly Albrecht, said he is anxious to host many of the new soldiers and their spouses who have joined the organization since the "War on Terror" involved the 34th Infantry Division. The Des Moines Chapter is the official host of the reunion and will sponsor activities at Camp Dodge as well as at the Stoney Creek Inn.

The main speaker at the reunion banquet will be Brig Gen Harold Thompson, who was mobilized as a CPT and Company Commander, along with 863 other soldiers in the 2-133rd Infantry Bn for Vietnam, 45 years ago. This is also the 50th Anniversary of the start of the Vietnam War.



The guest speaker for the Saturday Banquet for the 66th Annual Reunion of the 34th Infantry Division Association will be Brig Gen (Ret) Harold M. Thompson, former Deputy Adjutant General of Iowa and 34th Infantry Division Association member who was mobilized with the 2-133rd Infantry Battalion for combat duty in Vietnam.

45th Anniversary of 2-133rd Mobilization

This year we mark the 45th Anniversary of the mobilization of the 2nd Battalion, 133rd Infantry from NW lowa for the Vietnam War. The organization's active duty service was from 13 May 1968 thru 31 Dec 1969.

The 2-133rd Infantry was organized in the communities of Sioux City–HQ's and HQ's Co, Le Mars-Company A, Sheldon-Company B (-), Cherokee- Det 1, Co B, Ida Grove-Company C (-), Mapleton-Det 1 Co C. The history of the units in many of these communities trace back through WWII, WWI, Mexican Border Service and the Civil War.

The battalion had been selected in November 1965 as a SRF (Selected Reserve Force) Unit. This required the organization to increase their training readiness and drills from 12 to 18 unit training assemblies a quarter. The organization also received increased equipment issue.

The 863 officers and men of the 2nd Bn (Mech), 133rd Infantry, were mustered into Federal service on 13 May 1968 during six separate ceremonies in northwest Iowa towns. The battalion shipped its Armored Personnel Carriers by rail and the remaining equipment and wheeled vehicles convoyed to Fort Carson, Colorado. The majority of the soldiers were transported by commercial jet with the battalion closing on May 23rd. Major General Junior H. Miller, the Adjutant General of Iowa, visited all the mustering ceremonies for all the companies of the Bn.

The 2-133rd Infantry was organized as a battalion of the 69th Infantry Brigade of the mobilized Kansas National Guard. After 16 weeks of collective training, the battalion, as part of the brigade organization, was declared combat ready.

The 2-133rd Infantry did not enter combat as an organization. Individual officers and enlisted soldiers were levied from the battalion to fill shortages in regular army organizations. Of the 795 officers and men that were mobilized from the battalion, all but 150 served in Vietnam. Of those deployed from the battalion, a total of 12 men were killed in action and 63 men wounded in action. Our soldiers received 1 Soldiers Medal, 7 Silver Stars, 144 Air Medals, 137 Bronze Stars, 75 Purple Hearts, 294 Army Commendations Medals, 186 Combat Infantry Badges, 443 Good Conduct Medals, 795 National Defense Medals, 37 Vietnam Cross of Gallantries, 264 Vietnam Service Medals, and 264 Vietnam Campaign Medals for a total 2633 Medals for Vietnam Svc.

The soldiers of the 2d Battalion (M) 133d Infantry received a hearty welcome home in Dec 1969 to the cities of Sioux City, Le Mars, Sheldon, Cherokee, Ida Grove & Mapleton.

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The 34th Infantry Division at Faid & Kasserine

"On the fourteenth Rommel attacked and on the seventeenth we were running." These were the words of a veteran of the battle of Faid Pass. I heard this several times because that veteran was my father. Dad always called it the battle of Faid Pass, as did most others I know, but the world usually calls it Kasserine Pass. The time was February 1943.

These words about the battle sound like a clear vindication of the usual verdict that the green Americans were soundly trounced by the Germans. I have seen this kind of verdict often, especially as applied to the 34th Infantry and the 1st Armored divisions. I believe this verdict is too simple, too harsh, and misleading. Yes, of course, there were mistakes made, but the Americans were not the only ones making them.

These paragraphs are the opening of an article about the battle which has often been used to criticize and tarnish the Red Bull Division. I have had a great interest in this battle because of things my father told me over time.

My father was a veteran of this battle and more. He was my inspiration to become interested in WWII and I would like to share some of his comments and experiences.

Like others of his generation, Carl G. Haydon ioined the National Guard in the 30's to make a 'few extra bucks.' He was a member of A Company of the 168th Infantry Regiment of the 34th Infantry Division in Des Moines, Iowa. The 34th was federalized on February 10, 1941. After nearly a year of training, they were the first division the U.S. sent to Europe. Carl landed in Northern Ireland and later went to Scotland. His unit continued training until they were sent in on "Operation Torch," the invasion of North Africa. The 168th Inf landed in the Eastern-most of the landings and he tells how there was a French officer standing on the beach as they landed, looking at his watch and commenting exactly how much they were behind schedule.

For the Battale of Faid Pass, A Co, 1st Bn, 168th, was at Gafsa when the Germans attacked. However, this did not keep Carl safe from the attack since he was, at the time, temporarily detached to Regimental HQ that put him in right in the way of the main attack. Like others, he was included in the order to try to get through enemy

lines to American lines. His only description of this – other than that opening comment that they were running on the 17th – was that they traveled at night and by day hid in cactus patches. When I asked him, "wasn't that painful", he would just say, "Yes, but there weren't any Germans there."

I have no information on how large a group Carl traveled with, although his descriptions seem to imply it was small. Carl did tell that when they got back to their own lines, he was told that he beat an MIA telegram by three hours. I can only imagine the shock that would have been to my mother, as I was just five months old at the time. However, there were many who did receive such telegrams.

Carl survived this battle to go on to fight the rest of the African campaign including Hill 609. Then with the division they fought their way through Italy, as he put it: "kicking the Germans off one hill after another." He fought at places like Salerno, the Volturno, Monte Pantano, Cassino, Anzio, Rome, and so through to the end of the war in Italy.


A last related note on this battle comes from Carl about something at the end of the war. Since Carl was very senior in combat time when the war ended in Europe, he was among the first to be sent home along with others in similar situation. As intent as they were on getting home as quickly as possible, he tells that when they were about to leave they saw some of their guys who had been captured at Faid and were being sent home. They made sure the former POW's went first.

My father Carl was always proud of the 34th Infantry Division and their record throughout the war. Indeed the Red Bull has a proud history and the criticism leveled for Faid and Fondouk tend to ignore the circumstances and problems they faced. An article on the 34th Association website answers the Fonduok situation well and I hope the Faid article will inform all interested of how they were placed in an impossible situation at Faid and then criticized for not doing the impossible.

The Red Bulls were still being given modern equipment and were inadequately equipped as Light Infantry for the battle they faced against a Panzer Division. They were placed in a position with far too little equipment to defend far too much terrain. Virtually all the air support was German and supply was short. The higher commands' incompetence resulted in many of the impossible situations the Red Bulls faced and the poor

Dogfaces paid the penalty. You can read more details in the article.

It is true that there were men who failed the test, but most of these failures were because of a poor replacement training program. The Army program was still in its beginnings and many soldiers were totally unprepared for combat even to the point of not knowing how to operate their weapons. These failures would be corrected, but far too late for the 34th Division and others divisions in this battle.

The Regular Army 1st Armored Division and 1st Infantry Division also gets knocked for its performance. Most of the problem can be traced back to units being committed in a piece meal fashion, lack of modern weapons & communications equipment and a fragmented command structure. Yet, most of the time, these failures go unnoted while all the criticism falls on the 34th Infantry and 1st Armored. One fact often ignored is that the basic 'failure' of the 34th was that two infantry battalions were overrun by two veteran panzer divisions who had complete air superiority, far more artillery and supply. What could be expected under these conditions?



This photo shows 34th Infantry Division soldiers standing in a review for Sec of War Henry Stimson, Lt Gen Mark Clark and 34th Infantry Division Commander, Maj Gen Charles W. Ryder, on 6 July 1944 in the Collemezzano & Leghorn area of Italy. Two weeks after this photo, Gen Ryder would move up to Commander of the IX U.S. Corps, and he was replaced by Maj Gen Charles L. Bolte, who would command the 34th Division thru the end of the war. The party is riding in a Willys MB, U.S. Army Jeep showing the four stars of the 5th Army Commander.

The 34th Infantry Division amassed 517 days of direct combat with the enemy during WWII. One or more of the division organizations engaged in actual combat with the enemy 611 days. The Division was credited with more combat days than any other division in the European Theater.

During WWII the 34th Inf Div suffered 3,737 killed in action, 3,460 missing in action and 14,165 wounded in action, for a total of 21,362 battle causalities during the conflict. During the early part of the Italian campaign the 100th Infantry Battalion was assigned to the 133rd Infantry Regiment.

2-133rd Infantry Battalion Reunion Sept 14th, 2013 in Sioux City

Forty five years ago the 2-133rd Infantry Battalion was mobilized for service in Vietnam. This year the men who were mobilized as part of the organization in NW Iowa will host a reunion. 100th Infantry Battalion



100th Battalion, 34th Infantry Division, WWII

It is a photo of Lt. Masanao Otake shown shaking the hand of Under Secretary of War Robert Patterson, on August 1944 at the 34th Division's rest camp South of Vada, Italy. General Mark Clark, U.S. 5th Army commander, is shown in the background. Lt. Otake is congratulated after receiving a battlefield commission. He had served in the 100th Infantry Battalion since it was organized. At the time of this photo the 100th Battalion was still assigned to the 133rd Infantry Regiment, 34th Infantry Division in Italy.

Unfortunately, Lt Masanao Otake was killed two months later during a battle in the Vosges Mountains of France in what is known as the Rhineland Campaign, Sept 29, 1944 – Mar 21, 1945, after they were detached from the 133rd Infantry Battalion, 34th ID.

The 100th Battalion as part of the entire 442nd Regiment engaged in heavy fighting in Vosges Mountains near German border, liberating towns of Bruyeres and Biffontaine and rescuing the "Lost Battalion" of the 36th Infantry Division. The regiment sustained more than 800 casualties. The 100th was awarded a second Presidential Unit Citation for outstanding action during this period.

Today the 100th Infantry Battalion is still in existence as part of the Hawaii U.S. Army Reserve, 442nd Brigade Combat Team.

The 100th Infantry Battalion will celebrate the 71st Anniversary of the "Club 100th" on June 22nd of this year. The Veterans of the 100th Inf Bn have maintained a Club House in Honolulu Hawaii since they returned from WWII.
