Great Success- 67th Annual Reunion

1SG (Ret) John Jackson Celebrates 100th Birthday

John Jackson and William Littlejohn (not in photo) are the only two WWII bandsmen still living out of the thirty-eight men who were mobilized from Fairfield for World War II.

The highlight of the birthday party was when former band member went into a Jam Session and played for the enjoyment of the group. The key members of the Jam Session were Charlie Danialson and John Turner. Happy Birthday John! We are proud of you!

John C. Jackson, of Fairfield Iowa, and long time 34th Army Band member, celebrated his 100th Birthday on September 19, 2014.

John's father was in the National Guard and mentioned to his son, "He should join the 133rd Regt Band as they were going to the Worlds Fair in Chicago." John joined Service Company, 133rd Infantry on 27 Jun 1933, as a saxophone player, and accompanied the Band to the World's Fair. He has photos in an album to substantiate the claim.

By the time the 34th Infantry Division was mobilized on Feb 10, 1941, John was a SGT. When the Band shipped out to North Ireland, John Jackson was the 1st Sergeant of the unit. He told the group one of his most proud moments was when he led the Regimental Band, in front of the entire 133rd Infantry Regiment down the main street in Belfast, Northern Ireland. The streets were lined with cheering and flag waiving British citizens and they looked upon the U.S. soldiers as their saviors from the threat of the Germans.

John Jackson talks about the band's war duty in North Africa. The band members did guard duty, and served as stretcher bearers and burial detail. He mentioned that in Feb 43, the 133rd Band grew by three French horn players, which was all that was left of the 168th Inf Regt Band after the Faid Pass tragedy where approximately 1,200 U.S. soldiers were killed or captured. The band had not played their instruments for nine months prior to the Allied Victory Parade in Tunis in May 1943. The 133rd and 135th Bands played as a combined unit while the 135th Inf Regt marched in the parade with other Allied British and French military units.

After the 133rd Inf Regt joined the Allied landing in Salerno, Italy, the war was more of the same. The regimental bands combined in a MTOE Change on 1 Jan 1944 to form a 34th Division Band. During the Battle of Cassino they lost seven bandsmen to WIA and one KIA while on stretcher bearer duty.

John remained the 1SG through the end of WWII and was discharged, along with the other soldiers in the 34th Infantry Division, on 13 Jul 45.

He helped start the reactivated 34th Infantry Division Band on 21 Nov 1946 and served again as 1SG until his 60th birthday in 1974, in the same unit he joined in 1933. What a wonderful career John! Thank You for your service!!

The "combat newspaper" of the 34th Infantry Division was published weekly in Italy from March 17,1945, thru Sep 28,1945. The 34th Division returned home after 44 months in Europe and North Africa.

Artillery Fires More than 1,000,000 Shells Sets Record For World War II

Artillerymen of the veteran 34th "Red Bull" Division fired more than 1,125,639 shells at the Germans in World War II, it was revealed today. This figure is the greatest record of artillery-support-of-infantry of the war.

Each of the four battalions in the 34th Division Artillery has had its "Black Days", which may account for some of the enthusiasm with which the Artillerymen tossed shells at the Krauts.

Avenged Altavilla

The 151st Field Artillery Battalion avenged Altavilla, Italy, where four days after they landed at Salerno on D-Day, Sept. 9, 1943, the Germans heaped shells in on the 151st gun pits from mountain peak positions. The 151st held their beach head and stopped a counter attack by German Tanks with direct fire from their howitzers. (The 151st Field Artillery Battalion was stationed in Minneapolis before the war.)

The 125th Field Artillery Battalion remembered with a vengeance Nov. 29, 1943, when more than a score of Artillerymen fell at Scapoli, Italy. (The 125th FA Bn was stationed in Duluth, Minneapolis, Princeton, Milaca, Pine City, Anoka, MN prior to the war)

In January, 1944, The 175th Field Artillery Battalion took a beating from big shells at San Pietro, Italy, and the 175th didn't forget. (The 175th Field Artillery was created from a composite of units from the 125th, the 151st and the 185th FA when the Artillery Regiments were reduced to Battalions during reorganization.)

The 185th Field Artillery Battalion recalled the 40 casualties suffered by the battalion from the bombs of six Nazi planes at Venafro, Italy, in January, 1944. (The 185th FA was from Davenport, Boone Cedar Rapids and Grand Junction, IA.)

Work Together

During more than two years of combat, more than a thousand casualties have been sustained by the four artillery battalions of the 34th ID.

The artillery outfits have been working together so long that battery officers don't have to snap out a half dozen orders when telephone lines are to be laid, when the battery is to move, when gun positions must be prepared. The men know what has to be done and they do it. One battery commander makes a habit of announcing the exact time the battery will move when he has received a march order. When that hour arrives, he gets in his peep and starts - it's taken for granted that the battery is ready, packed, and set to roll. He doesn't look back to check - it isn't necessary. And the men have never let him down.
