

34th Infantry Division Assn. 73rd Annual Reunion Virtual Meeting, Oct 3, 1400hrs

34th Infantry Division Association President, Nicholas Jedlicka, made an announcement in the Spring 2020 Newsletter that the Annual Reunion was cancelled due to the Virus, but we may have a virtual online 73rd Annual Business Meeting, utilizing our computers.

And that is what occurred, when the 34th Infantry Division Association members logged in from their own homes, to the "GoToMeeting" software, for a Reunion meeting set up by the Association President. This Virtual Meeting took the place of the originally scheduled 73rd Annual Reunion. We had approximately 22 members participate, with many more logged in at one time or another using cell phones, for the two hour gathering.

Greetings Fellow 34th Inf Div Assn. Members,

I give a big "Thank You" to everyone who made the Virtual 73rd Annual Reunion Meeting possible on Sat, 2 Oct. We learned that people do want to attend virtual meetings and hope to set up another opportunity for a follow on meeting in the future.

One item that came out of the discussion at our virtual meeting was the problem of suicide among our service members. According to the DoD report, 498 U.S. military service members (all branches) died by their own hand in 2019. This is higher than the 326 service members lost to suicide in the previous calendar year. According to previous reports, the National Guard has higher rates of suicide than any other military component, and yet we have the least available support. As of Oct. 1, 2020, a total of 77 Guardsmen have taken their own lives this year. We must address this issue. Some wonder for the COVID 19 Virus quarantine has a impact on this. Talk to your fellow soldiers. Ask our legislative leaders for help. This tragedy must be addressed.

I ask that those of you who have not sent the Association their Email address, please do so. You will save our volunteers much work and the Association a lot of money \$\$ in print and mailing costs.

I thank all the Officers and Trustees for their service during the past year and ask that you continue to serve another year thru to the 2021 Reunion. I am very happy to continue on as president for another year to carry us thru the Corona Virus epidemic.

The Last WWII, 34th Infantry Division Ranger Volunteer Passes

MSG Lester Bernard Cook, 97, passed away August 9, 2020 at the Veterans Affairs Hospital in Des Moines, IA. Lester was born Sept 25, 1922 in Des Moines, IA, to Otis and Florence Cook.


Lester graduated from East High School and immediately began his long and decorated military career with the US Army. In February of 1941 he enlisted into Co. A, 1st Battalion, 168th Infantry, Iowa National Guard, 34th Infantry Division. The entire 1st Battalion, departed from Des Moines Rock Island Railroad Depot shortly after Feb. 10, 1941, for Camp Claiborne, LA. While at Camp Claiborne, the 34th Division went through extensive training to include participation in the Louisiana Maneuvers.

After the surprise Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, the 34th Infantry Division was ordered to move immediately for Europe. They loaded on trains and moved to Fort Dix, NJ. Between January and March 1941, all divisional units had been shipped to Northern Ireland. The 34th Inf Div. was the first U.S. Army Division to arrive in Europe for WWII. The 1st and 2nd Bn's of the 168th Inf traveled across the Atlantic on the "SS Duchess of Athol."

While training in Northern Ireland, Pvt. Lester Cook, and many other 34th Infantry Division soldiers, volunteered and were selected to serve in the U.S. Army Rangers, also know at the time as Commandos. They later became known as Darby's Rangers. Through the entire war Lester Cook served with his Iowa 168th Infantry friend, and leader, MAJ Lester Kness, from Audubon, IA, who passed away last year. At the end of the war MAJ Kness served as Commander of the 4th Ranger Battalion.

The 1st Ranger Battalion of "Darby's Rangers" was an elite special operations force that trained with the British Commandos in Archnacarry, Scotland. Out of 1500+ men who volunteered when the 1st Ranger Battalion was assembled, only 500 were chosen to undergo the realistic and rugged training under live fire.

"My understanding is that I am the only one of us still alive," said Sgt. Cook by telephone recently. That status ranks him as the "Lone Ranger."



"I had no idea what I was getting into when I saw a notice on the bulletin board about the Rangers. Lester embarked on a military career that spanned three wars and 26 years. The "boy" from the Eastside of Des Moines became a man who earned 2 Silver Stars, 4 Purple Hearts, 2 Presidential Unit Citations among many other accolades for intrepid exploits in faraway battlefields ranging from North Africa, Sicily, Italy to Korea and Vietnam.

He served the full tour with Darby's Rangers. He was awarded his first Silver Star Medal for action on the Winter Line in Venafro, Italy. After fighting the Germans at Cisterna, Italy with the 4th Rangers as a SGT, he had enough time to return home with 197 other seasoned Rangers on the ship "SS Edward Richardson." The Rangers disembarked at Hampton Roads, Virginia on 3 May, 1944. They were transported to Camp Butner, North Carolina.

After the Rangers returned from much needed furloughs, they were honored and presented awards in June of 1944. Life magazine covered the event. By the time VE Day was finally achieved, Sgt. Cook was back at Fort Campbell in Kentucky. He recalls his distinguished service now with the unique mix of matter-of-fact modesty and pride that's like a birthmark of the Greatest Generation. "I wasn't there (in Europe) then, so I don't remember really celebrating," he said. "But I sure was glad that it was over."

SGT Cook continued his military career serving in the Korean War. He served as a platoon SGT with the 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team "Rakkasans." He earned another Silver Star Medal in his tour in Korea. In Vietnam Lester served as the SGT Major of the 77th Special Service Group.

After his military career, Lester began a second, less hazardous one, as another type of public servant with the US Postal Service that lasted 27 more years.

This past summer, in July 2020, MSGT Lester B Cook (ret), was inducted into The Ranger Hall of Fame at Fort Benning, Georgia. "I won't be there because my wife broke her leg and can't travel," he said. "But they said they'll come and deliver (the award) to me out at Camp Dodge in July." Lester was asked by David Williams (President of Descendants of WWII Rangers. Org.) Why after all those years refusing to accept the honor did he agree to accept the RHOF induction? Lester replied "David, I am the only one left."

Sadly, Ranger Lester B. Cook experienced a stroke and died 9 August 2020. His Lord and his beloved Rangers will be there to welcome him home.

Lester was known for being stubborn, but funny, and could be seen out on his bicycle until he was in his late 70's. He also enjoyed his model trains, fishing, reading books, and watching "The History Channel" where he was always pointing out the inaccuracies in the military programs. To sum up Lester's life, he set an example for others to follow.

Eight National Guard Divisions

WASHINGTON — The Army National Guard has plans to move most of its infantry and armor brigades under the command of its eight established division headquarters, as it reorganizes its fighting formations to give the force more combat power and some soldiers new career opportunities, officials said.

The Army Guard move will mark a substantial increase in the number of fully manned divisions that the U.S. Army can deploy, as only the service's 10 active-duty divisions are now filled out with subordinate units, said Lt. Gen. Daniel Hokanson, the director of the Army National Guard. The increase to 18 complete Army divisions comes at a time when service officials believe a major conflict with a near-peer rival namely "Russia or China" would require the employment of full divisions.

For the last two decades, the Army has focused on its smaller brigade combat teams as its primary fighting elements for counterterrorism operations and deployments focused on assisting the forces of other nations.

"When you look at the [2018] National Defense Strategy and competition among near-peer competitors, peer competitors — that great power competition, there is a potential for large-scale combat operations ... and it could actually be division level fights," Hokanson said in an interview Thursday ahead of the Guard's planned announcement Saturday. "We wanted to make sure that everything that the Army National Guard did was in support of the total Army and the National Defense Strategy, and one issue was that our divisions are just headquarters they don't have actual brigades assigned under them."

The National Defense Strategy, crafted by former Defense Secretary Jim Mattis, guides the Pentagon on future planning, placing the potential for major conflict with rivals China and Russia as the nation's primary national security threat. For the two decades prior, the military had focused almost exclusively on fighting transnational terrorist

organizations, which the strategy defined as a lesser threat than those posed by nation-state competitors.

The Army National Guard now has eight Division headquarters elements stationed in Virginia -29th, Texas -36th, Pennsylvania -28th, Minnesota -34th, Kansas -35th, Indiana -38th, California -40th and New York -42nd, which are each made up of approximately 300 soldiers. Most have established relationships with subordinate units, but none are fully manned in the way the Regular Army has built its divisions, which boast about 20,000.

Fred was mobilized in Des Moines at the Argon Armory and served in Co D, (Weapons Co) in the Heavy Machine Gun Section and was a Squad leader for a section with the M1917A1 (Heavy) Water-Cooled Machine Gun.

This photo was taken at the 34th Infantry Division WWII Memorial at Camp Dodge in July 2020. Fred speculates he may be the last living member of D Company, 168th, who was mobilized with the National Guard, 34th Infantry Division, on February 10, 1941, prior to WWII, and sent to Camp Claiborne, LA, by a Rock Island railroad train, for training.

The museum staff were able to find a 1941 Company D / 168^{th} Inf Regt group showing CPL Fred Adams. Fred recounted his experiences and soldiers he had served with in Ireland, North Africa, and Italy.

Fred received a Purple Heart for a shrapnel wound in the neck while participating in the N Africa fight for Hill 609. He said a German Potato Masher grenade went off between him and another soldier and wounded both of them. He still carries some of the shrapnel in his neck to this day.
