The Reunion Memorial Service of the 34th Inf Div Assn. was conducted by Chaplain MAJ Cory Van Sloten, 2nd IBCT.

Our guest speaker was LTC Aaron Baugher, current Training Officer for the Iowa Joint Forces HQ's and past commander of the 1-168th Infantry Battalion. LTC Baugher has served in Iraq and Afghanistan, and spoke about his feelings of pride and accomplishment after his service as a "Red Bull" Infantryman. He stated, "We can all look back with pride on our "Red Bull" service." LTC Baugher brought forward his prospective, to share with everyone, after his tour of duty as S3 Operations Officer with the 133rd Infantry Battalion and having been on the ground at the "Battle of Do Ab", in Nuristan Province, on 25 May 2011.

1-194th FA Deployment 2020 - 2021

The 1st Battalion, 194th Field Artillery successfully executed the Air Defense C-RAM mission and an indirect fires mission, defending CJTF-OIR, USFOR-A and RSHQ strategic critical assets from enemy IDF, C-UAS threats, and protecting the lives of many thousands of Coalition Force military and civilian personnel throughout the CENTCOM AOR. The battalion was stationed at multiple undisclosed locations in Iraq, and Afghanistan during their deployment.

The Counter-Rocket, Artillery, Mortar (C-RAM) Intercept Land-based Phalanx Weapon System (LPWS) which gives the ADA unit the ability to defend against and defeat enduring Indirect Fire (IDF) threats from rockets, mortars, artillery and drones. The primary components of the system are the LPWS, a modified U.S. Navy Phalanx Close-In Weapon System mounted on a commercial 35-ton semitrailer for land-based operations, the M61A1, 20 mm Gatling gun capable of onboard target acquisition and fire control system, and the Integrated search-and-track radars detect and engage wide range of IDF threats.

TF 1-194 AR, 34th ID, Supports Afghanistan Evacuation

KABUL, Afghanistan — Minnesota National Guard's Task Force 1-194 mobilized in March 2021 to serve as the United States Central Command (CENTCOM) Regional Response Force based in Camp Buehring, Kuwait. The Regional Response Force, part of Task Force Spartan under Operation Spartan Shield, is postured for rapid deployment within the CENTCOM area to support strategic and operational requirements.

With its strategic assignment at Camp Buehring, Kuwait, Task Force 1-194 was positioned to respond to the Kabul Afghanistan Noncombatant Evacuation Operation, announced by the U.S. State Dept. and supported by the DOD. Alongside units from the 82nd Airborne Div, 10th Mountain Divn, Marine Special Purpose Air-Ground Task Force, and Marine Expeditionary Unit, Task Force 1-194 AR was trained and ready when called for rapid deployment in support of Operation Allies Refuge in Kabul, Afghanistan.

The 1-194 AR Task Force mission was to secure vital sectors of Hamid Karzai International Airport, and also provide humanitarian assistance to U.S. citizens, special immigrant visa holders, and their families.

"The Soldiers of Task Force 1-194 Armor, were called upon to execute a challenging mission, and they have done so with professionalism," said Task Force 1-194 AR Cdr, Army Lt. Col. Jake Helgestad. "They have shown strength, compassion, and resolve despite danger



34th Infantry Division Organization Supports Afghanistan Evacuation

Approximately 1,100 Soldiers from Task Force 1-194th Armor, Minnesota National Guard, deployed to the Middle East in early 2021 for a nine-month mission in support of Operation Spartan Shield. While deployed at Camp Buehring, Kuwait, the Soldiers assumed responsibilities within the CENTCOM area of operations assuming the Operation Spartan Shield response force mission.

What the 34th Infantry Division Soldiers did not know, is they would soon find themselves, on the front lines of the operation, at the Kabul Airport, in response to Operation Allies Refuge. With its strategic assignment at Camp Buehring, Kuwait, Task Force 1-194 was positioned to respond to the Afghanistan Noncombatant Evacuation Operation announced by the U.S. State Dept. and supported by the DOD. The 34th "Red Bulls", served alongside brigades from the 82nd Airborne Division, 10th Mountain Division, Marine Special Purpose Air-Ground Task Force, and a Marine Expeditionary Unit, all under the leadership of the 82nd Airborne Division Commander.

Task Force 1-194th Armor flew on U.S. Air Force C-17 Globemaster aircraft, on August 17, 2021, responding to the Noncombatant Evacuation Operation announced by the Department of State, supported by the Department of Defense. They flew directly to Hamid Karzai International Airport when called upon for rapid deployment in support of Operation Allies Refuge in Kabul, Afghanistan.

"The interaction with the citizens they were evacuating, the Afghans that were at risk, that's a part of the story that I'm extremely proud of," said Col. Timothy Kemp, commander of the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 34th Red Bull Infantry Division.

When a deadly explosion rocked one of the airport's gates last week, Guard leaders waited in Minnesota to see if any of their soldiers were hurt but eventually learned they were securing a different part of the airport. The 34th Infantry Division soldiers continued with their mission after the suicide bombing at the Kabul Airport, which killed 13 United States servicemen and women.

MN Gov. Tim Walz says he's proud of the men and women of the MN National Guard, 34th Infantry Division soldiers, who just played a key role to the end of the 20-year war in Afghanistan.

"They performed, by all accounts, heroically," Gov. Tim Walz said at the Minnesota State Fair.

"They did what they needed to do. They were part of that evacuation to save lives and we've got them back (in Kuwait) now." The governor said there were anxious days in the immediate aftermath of the terrorist bombing at the airport in Kabul that killed 13 U.S. military service members.

Gov. Tim Walz stated, "It took about 72 hours to get official word that no Minnesotans were among the causalities, and we made sure that all families were notified accordingly.

The Last Minnesota Bataan Death March Soldier Passed Away

Walt Straka, lifelong Brainerd resident and Minnesota's the last survivor of the infamous Bataan Death March, passed away Sunday, July 4. He was 101 years old. The death of PVT Walter Straka, Company A, 194th Tank Battalion, was announced in a Facebook post by 1st Combined Arms Battalion, 194th Armor. MN ARNG.

"It is with heavy heart that we announce that Walter Straka passed away this morning on Independence Day, July 4th 2021 at the age of 101. Mr. Straka was an extraordinary man who by his own account 'should have been dead a thousand times.' Mr. Straka was Minnesota's last living survivor of the Bataan Death March where he and thousands of others were forced to march 65 miles over 6 days. After the war, Mr. Straka resided peacefully in Brainerd where he ran a successful business and raised a family.

In September 1941, Straka's unit, the 194th Tank Battalion, was ordered to the Philippines, just months before the attack on Pearl Harbor. Stationed near Clark Field on the island of Luzon, they represented the first tank unit in the Far East before World War II. Isolated and without supplies, they fought on until ordered to surrender with the fall of Bataan on April 9, 1942.

After the April 9, 1942 U.S. surrender of the Bataan Peninsula on the main Philippine island of Luzon to the Japanese during World War II (1939-45), the approximately 75,000 Filipino and American troops on Bataan were forced to make an arduous 65-mile march to prison camps between April 9th and the 17, 1942. The marchers made the trek in intense heat and were subjected to harsh treatment by Japanese guards. Thousands perished in what became known as the Bataan Death March.

Of the 64 men from Brainerd's 194th tank company who went to the Philippines, three were killed in action and 29 died as POWs; only thirty-two survived captivity. The Bataan POW theme Poem was, "We're the Battling Bastards of Bataan, and Nobody Gives A Damn."
