The first three days of the month were occupied with the offensive of the Regiment across the Uccina River and a westward encirclement of the town of Cecina itself. This action constituted another attempt on the part of the enemy to delay our forces as they pursued him on his retreat northward. As he had done so many times in the past, maximum use was made of the town of Uccina and the natural obstacle of the Uccina River to form a strong point from which to defend and make a stand. On July 1 the Second Battalion attacked across the river, with one company of tanks and another of tank destroyers in support. The mission was to first cut off Route No.68 and then turn west toward the coast, cutting off Highway No.1. On July 2 the attack was coordinated with that of the Third Battalion and the operation was carried out successfully despite enemy counter-attacks, numerous mire fields and constant anti-tank and S/P gun fire.

Our artillery was able to find numerous profitable targets and in several instances were able to destroy well dug-in, camouflaged pill boxes, and assisted immeasurably in breaking up the attempts of the enemy to counter-attack our forces.

With the fall of the enemy positions above the Cecina River, the Regiment continued the pursuit northward along the Tyrrnenian coast of Italy. Hany mines and incessant harrassing artillery fire were encountered as the Regiment relentlessly pushed northward after the retreating 16th "Reichsfüher" SS Division. The struggle for the capture of Rosignano opened on July 3 with the Third and First Battalions moving forward through Vada. There was evicence that the enemy withdrawn in haste but prisoners were not plentiful.

Initial contact with the enemy soon demonstrated that the Germans had der termined to make a firm stand for the town. Small arms fire developed into numberous and intense fire fights and the enemy, with excellent observation, made much use of S/P guns, artillery and mortars. The R giment was committed to the attack on the Rosignano position with the Third Battalion on the left and the rirst Battalion on the right. The main effort was made by the Third Battalion which had the mission of capturing the town and the road leading north. After much opposition from the enemy and difficulties with the terrain, the leading elements of the Third Battalion entered the town successfully, with tanks leading the attack, but casualties were severe and although surrounded by the enemy during the night they organized strong points and held their positions. This pressure was relieved on the morning of July 4 when a platoon from "L" Company pushed around toward the left edge of the town and by 1800 we held possession of half the town. The First Battalion, meeting much enemy fire, was unable to make any great degree of progress.

The battle for the town grew to a heavy engagement as the enemy, moving in reinforcements, regrouped and counter-attacked. These counter-attacks, while not involving large numbers, made our progress slow. Snipers were very much in aveidence.

A considerable number of civilians had remained in the town and the heavy fighting made it impossible for them to leave. Many were killed and wounded, and the Partisans who had been giving our men token aid in the fighting, removed as many as possible. At the time of the capture of the town it was feared that an epidemic might break out as a result of the many dead littering the streets and Rosignano was placed off limits to all troops except those who were forced to remain.

Our attacks were renewed on the 11 and by late afternoon the enemy was forced back. We captured prisoners and inflicted heavy casualties and seized some material, including artillery pieces. The Germans, with their shortage of transportation, were forced to resort to the use of exen to pull out some of their artillery. It was also discovered that the G rmans were using wooden carts brought into Ttaly from Russia.

On July 11 Lt. General Mark W. Clark, accompanied by General Ryder, visited the Regimental CP where General Clark personally pinned the silver eagle on the collar of the Regimental Commander, Colonel Ashton H. Manhart, making him a full colonel. General Clark also greeted members of the staff.

Following the capture of Rosignano the regiment continued the attack northward with the First and Second Battalic s on the line, the Third in reserve. The pace was slow because of the difficult mountain terrain, combined with mines machine and S/P gun fire. The new mission was to capture and secure Leghorn. It was quite obvious that the capture of this great port was extremely important to future operations both in Italy and in the southern coast of france. Again, the Partisans gave the Regiment assistance, acting as guides. Roads were found to be in a very bad condition and the engineers were unable to keep up with the forward troops. After fighting northward through Castelnuevo and to Gaboro it was reported by civilians at the later town that the retiring Germans were SS troops, about 16 to 20 years of age. They had four or five pieces of artillery, four machine guns and the remainder had rifles. East of the Germans marched, having no vehicles to ride, their clothing was worn out, the men were shabby looking and had no food. They stole food from the civilians. It was felt that this group was tired of the war and disorganized.

On July 13 the Regiment lost one of its finest officers when Captain Blowmen commander of the Cannon Company, was instantly killed by a mine while on reconnaissance to displace his guns forward. Long and loyal service had been rendered by Captain Blommen to the Regiment and many of its past successes and victories were made possible by the excellent support given by his cannon company.

The combined efforts of the First and Second Battalions enabled the Regiment to sweep forward toward the last range of mountains circling Leghorn. The Third Battalion, being committed through the First and Second Battalions and exploiting the success of these two units, succeeded in capturing the high dominting hills to the east of Lighorn on July 18 and on the same day Company "G" of the Second Battalion moved into what was known as the Popagana Vecchic area where they were firedupon by the enemy. After exchanging some small arms fire they discovered an estimated 200 of the enemy in the hills and draws. Captain Brehinger and Lieutenant Brown ran to a disabled armored car and turned its machine gun and 37 mm anti-tank gun against the Germans and at the same time Lt. Col. Castille moved to a nearby house and directed artillery fire which set the brush ablaze. If my of the enemy were trapped, although few prisoners were taken.

An OP report said that ships were sighted leaving the harbor at Leghorn and an air mission was sent out. It was later learned that the Germans were using these ships, which had been filled with concrete, to block the harbor. Numerous explosions, probably demolitions, were heard in the vicinity of the port. A report from corps said that there were definite signs that the enemy was withdrawing to the east in our sector, and General Ryder expressed the hope that the Regiment would be able to occupy Leghorn soon. It. General Mark W. Clark visited the CP on July 18, conferring with colonel Manhart.

Our patrols reached Leghorn the night of the 18 and on the morning of the 19 columns of vehicles carrying war correspondents, engineers and many others entered at the same time as troops from the Second Battalion moved in with the mission of garrisoning the southern part of the town. The troops reorganized and rested for the remainder of the day. A few enemy shells dropped into the city, causing little damage.

After a short rest of two days the Regiment moved forward in the direction of Pisa. Three bridges on Highway No. 1 were blown out. The roads were not mined and it was possible to move organic transportation up in support of the troops. On July 22 a patrol from company "G" was sent out to the airport south of Pisa and came back from the mission with a German patrol of six men captured intact. Another patrol did not meet with any resistance. The road north of the airport was secured for use as a line of departure for the assault on Pisa.

No great difficulty was experienced in securing the part of the city south of the Arno River. Enemy artillery fire was light and there was little harrassing small arms fire. With few casualties, the Regiment secured the southern banks of the Arno River and occupied the portion of Pisa south of the river.

A new, heavy rocket weapon was used by the Germans at Pisa. The rocket could be seen floating through the air but could not be heard. One of the rocket shells was sent to the 125 Artillery and it was described as about five inches in diameter, twenty inches long with a bulb-like nose about eight inches round. One type shell is concussion and the other incendiary.

On July 25 the Regiment less the rirst battalion began moving back to an assembly and rest area near Rosignano Solvay and castiglioncello, the First Battalion remaining on the line throughout the remainder of the month.



SECTION VII -- CITATIONS AND AMARDS, I July through 31 July 1914.

A. THE FOLLOWING HARED OFFICERS AND AMLISTED HEN HAVE BEEN RECOMMENDED FOR DECORATIONS AND AWARDS AS INDICATED BELOW:

1. Distinguished Service Cross

a. ALBERT E. GELIMAN, 32855259, Private First Class, Company "G", 135th Infantry Regiment. For extraordinary heroism in action on 1 June 1904 in the vicinity of Casteleone, Italy. While their platoon was making an assault on strong energy positions, it was necessary to cross an oat field approximately 600 yards long. All friendly tanks had been knocked out during a terrific armor battle and the infantry was informed by the tankmen of enesty antitank guns near the objective, a clump of houses along the Albano-Anzio highway. Upon reaching the objective one squad was seen by the enemy who opened fire, killing two men and wounding three. Pfc. Gellman's squad withdrew to a shallow ditch in the rear of the house, and from this position enemy personnel could be seen through a large shell hole in the house. After a burst of small arms fire the enemy waved a white flag but refused to leave the house. Pfc. Gellman and a companion volunteered to crawl out and capture the enemy. Cautiously approaching the house, they captured the enemy and forced them to crawl back across the yard on their stomachs. Seeing fore of the enemy in the next house, Pfc. Gellman and his companion crossed the next yard and captured six more of the enmy, and they too were forced to crawl back across the yard. With four of their comrades covering them, Pfc. Gellman and his comrade proceeded across the highway to a third house. They opened fire on the enemy stationed there, who immediately took cover in an old time cellar. Advancing cautiously, Pfc. Gallman and his companion reached a point on each side of the ware cellar and then the enemy refused to surrender, rolled a hand grenade down. A few econds later eleven energy marched out and surrendered. Directing the energy to crawl. Lock to the imericans across the road, Pfc. Gellaman proceeded to investigate the house there two 47 mm antitank guns were found under the corners of the house. Just as they were preparing to put the guns out of commission, a barrage of our own artillery came in and the two men were forced to work their way back across the read to our lines. The position of the two guns was given to the tankmen the brought up a medium tank on the flank and knocked the house down thus burying the guns. This gallant action displayed by Pfc. Gellman in the face of grave danger was an inspiration to his comrades and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from Albany, New York.

b. ,DAVID (NMI) LOPEZ, 36621697, Staff Sergeant, Company "L", 135th Infantry Regiment. For extraordinary heroism in action on 1 June 1944 in the vicinity of Lamuvio, Italy. S/Sgt Lopez did display great courage and extraordinary heroism in knocking out two enemy machine guns which were holding up the advance of his company. Across open terrain and through withering fire, he approached to within 30 yards of one of the machine guns where, firing his "Tommy" gun, he killed the gunner and forced the four other members of the crew to surrender. With the assistance of another man, S/Sgt Lopez then advanced upon the other machine gun, only 40 yards away and killed the four enemy who were manning it. The company was now able to continue its attack and take its objective. However, in knocking out the second machine gun, one os S/Sgt Lopez's legs was shattered by the enemy's fire. Unwilling to become a burden on his comrades when they were forced to withdraw during the counter-attack which followed, he was left behind and taken prisoner. But he maintained his wits and courage although suffering intense pain, and picked up valuable information of the enemy's strength. As a result, when his comrades, inspired by his heroism, attacked again and recaptured him, they were able to make use of this information in beating off another fierce enemy assault which shortly thereafter took place. S/Sgt Lopez's great bravery and his intense devotion to duty reflects the greatest credit upon himself and our Armed Forces and will ever be a source of inspiration to the men of his battelion. His intrepid accomplishment exemplify the "never say die" tradition of the American infantryman.

1. Distinguished Service Cross, contid.

- c. FRANCIS H. GISBORNE, 39321777, Private, Headquarters Company, 135th Infantry Regiment. For extraordinary haroism in action on 8 February 1944 in the vicinity of Cassino, Italy. Pvt. Gisborne of his own initiative three times left his position of cover and exposed himself to intense enemy fire to silence an enemy machine gun and kill 2 snipers. In the face of a severe enemy counter-attack, Pvt. Gisborne with utter disregard for his own safety bravely advanced to within 30 feet of the enemy, stood up in full view of them and killed four and wounded another to completely disrupt the attacking enemy forces and alone repel their assault. Though himself wounded, Fvt. Gisborne voluntarily chose to remain with his hard pressed comrades. He directed the fire of a BAR team in repelling numerous enemy counterattacks until he and the 7 other heroic survivors of an original force of 41 men were finally releived. Pvt. Gisborne's extraordinary heroism and his tenaciousness in the the face of great odds reflects the greatest credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. As one of his comrades witnessing his intrepid efforts remarked, "That darn doughboy is a one man army." And by his great fighting spirit, Pvt. Gisborne literally proved it so. Entered military service from Eugene, Oregon.
- do GEORGE G. HALL, 6152041; Staff Sergeant, Company "B", 135th Infantry For extraordinary heroism in action on 23 May 1944 in the vicinity of Anzio, Italy. S/Sgt Hall, a squad leader, did by his extraordinary heroism in the face of blazing enemy machine gun fire enable his company to successfully accomplish their role in the drive to break out of the Anzio beachhead. When his company was pinned down shortly after the start of their drive by three hostile machine gun nests, S/Sgt Hall volunteered to eliminate this deadly obstacle. Crawling along a ploughed furrow and ignoring the furious hail of lead the enemy threw at him, S/Sgt Hall made his way to within hand grenade range of the enemy position. Here he pounded them with four hand grenades and when the smoke had died away, S/Sgt Hall and two dead enemy occupied the position and four of the enemy were crawling back to his company as prisoners. There being a quantity of potato masher grenades in the position he now occupied and the second machine gun nest only a short distance away, S/Sgt Hall began pelting them with these. Although the enemy flung grenades of their own at him and hurled a torrent of bullets at his head everytime he exposed himself, S/Sgt Hall never once relinquished his efforts. The deadly duel finally ended in S/Sgt Hall's favor when four of the mighty Wehrmacht yelled "Komerad" and five morelay dead. S/Sgt Hall now turned to the remaining machine gun nest some fifty yards away. Again calmly squirming along a furrow in the ground, with the enemy firing frantically at this threatening one man army, he was almost withing grenade range when enemy artillery began landing. One shell landed too close and the brave sergeant's right leg was blown off. But S/Sgt Hall had accomplished his mission. With the two enemy machine guns eliminated, the company was able to flank the third and continue its advance without incurring excessive casualities. S/Sgt Hall's fearlessness, his determined fighting spirit and his great bravery reflect the highest credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. His deeds emphasizes the deadly striking power thant has been developed in the American Infantryman and should earn for him a niche in our national gallery of immortal fighting men. Entered military service from Stoneham, Mass.
- e. CHARLES H. BUSSEY, 18074984, Technical Sergeant, Company "G", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 1 February 1944. T/Sgt Bussey, then Private First Class, did while as an acting squad leader through his initiative and gallantry enable his squad and platoon to take their company's objective. During the attack the first scout was wounded whereupon Pvt 1cl Bussey continued to lead the attack up the hill. Near the top of the hill he took as a prisoner a radio operator who had been directing fire on the elements, thereby depriving the enemy of vital observation.

Upon reaching the top of the hill, he knocked out a machine gun nest which had been holding up the advance, killing one man and wounding another. T/Sgt Bussey then assembled his men and led them into the attack in the face of heave small arms fire. The attack was successful and resulted in driving the enemy from the hill. The aggressive initiative and disregard of personal safety displayed by T/Sgt Bussey was an inspiration to his men and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from Big Springs, Texas.

fo RALPH D. BAKER, 33696282, Private, Company "G", 135th Infantry Regiment. For extraordinary heroism in action on 1 June 1944 in the vicinity of Casteleone, Italy While the platoon was making an assault on strong enemy positions, it was necessary to cross an oat field approximately 6.0 yards longs. All friendly tanks had been knocked out during a terrific armor battle and the infantry was informed by the tankmen of enemy antitank guns near the objective, a clump of houses along the Albano-Anzio highway. Upon reaching the objective one squad was seen by the enemy who opened fire, killing two men and wounding three. Pvt. Baker's squad withdrew to a challow ditch in the rear of the house and from this position enemy personnel could be seen through a large shell hole in the house. Baker proceeded to investigate the house where two 47 mm antitank guns were found under the corners of the house. Just as they were preparing to put the guns out of commission a barrage of our own artillery came in and the two men were forced to work their way back across the road to our lines. The position of the two guns was given to the tankmen who brought up a medium tank on the flank and knocked the house down thus burying the guns. This gallant action displayed by Fvt Baker in the face of grave danger was an inspiration to his comrades and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pittsburg, Pa.

g. CHARLES W. MILLS, 0-362360, Captain, Medical Corps, 135th Infantry Regiment. For extraordinary heroism in action. During the period of 30 May to 1 June 1944, in the vicinity of Lanuvio, Italy, Capt. Mills seeing that immediate aid would be necessary for the battalion, did establish and maintain his 3rd Bn. aid station at a point 400 yards from the front lines. Capt. Kills personally organized his litter squads and supervised the evacuation of all wounded men including men from the two adjacent units whose aid stations were located well to the rear. On 30 May during a seven hour period, Capt. Mills and his aid station evacuated over one hundred and seventy casualties. On the following day some one hundred and sixty-two casualties passed through his aid station, again a number far in excess of the normal number of casualties processed by a battalion aid station. During the three day period, Capt. Mills spent considerable time on the battle field rendering first aid to men as they fell in the attack, all the while being subjected to enemy sniper, machine gun, martar and artillery fire. Capt. Mills was handicapped by numerous casualties within his detachment, but realizing that the lives saved far offset those lost, refused to move his aid station further to the rear. On 1 June, being seriously hambicapped by the loss of litter bearers, he recruited twenty-four men with no previous training in aid work and personally directed them in evacuating the wounded.

During and enemy counter-attack late in the afternoon on that same day when the enemy succeeded in inflicting heavy losses and disorganizing our forces, Capt Mills not only treated all casualties, but also reorganized those men not wounded and sent them buck up to the line for duty. In doing so he assisted in stopping an enemy counter-attack. The untiring loyalty, and devotion to duty displayed by Capt Mills under extreme heavey enemy fire, was an inspiration to the men of his battalion and well demonstrated the heroic and courageous tradition of the Medical Corps. The innumerable number of lives which were saved by Capt Mills brings credit to the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered military service from St. Louis, Missouri.

2. Silver Star

a. BYRON G. HARPER, 35139975, Technician Fifth Grade, Medical Detachment, 135th Infantry Regiment. Tec 5 Harper, a company medical aid man, did by his heroic action during a fierce angagement with the enemy assist in saving the lives of many wounded. Although intense enemy mortar artillery and machine gun fire was making all infantry movement impossible and even causing some troops to withdraw in disorder, Tec 5 Harper continually rosmed the area bringing succor to all the wounded he could find without concern for his own safety. During the period several litter bearers and aid men were killed, for the enemy paid not the slightest respect for the Red Cross insignia but continually sniped at all wearing it. Despite this, Tec 5 Harper courageously and tirele sly went about aiding not only the men of his own company but men of adjacent companies and battalions. Tec 5 Harper's gallant devotion to duty under the most rugged combat conditions deserves high commendation and is exemplary of the traditional bravery of our infantry Medical Corpsmen.

b. EMIL O. FROHM, 37027328, Staff Sergeant, Company "K", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 26 May 1944 in the vicinity of Velletri, Italy. S/Sgt Frohm has throughout the Tunisian Campaign and in all the battles of the Italian campaign, to date, performed work of an extremely courageous and outstanding character. Both as a private and as a non-commissioned officer his heroic behavior in the face of the enemy has been a source of inspiration to his comrades. On 26 May S/Sgt Frohm accomplished some exceptically gallant deeds. When several of the men in his platon became lost during a rapid advance against the enemy, Sgt Frohm boldly went out on a patrol several hundred yards behind the enemy lines to seek the lost men. Despite their daring efforts, however, Sgt Frohm and the two men with him were unable to find their missing comrades. S/Sgt Frohm then returned to his platoon and often exposing himself to intense enemy fire, magnificently employed his squad to enable the platoon to hold an isolated position subjected to heavy hostile fire. Later in the day when the platoon was ordered to withdraw, S/Sgt Frohm found one of his men was missing. Going back to look for him, S/Sgt Frohm found him being led away by the enemy. He quickly set out on the double after them. One of the enemy heard him, turned and started to open up with his machine pistol. However, Sgt Frohm and his "Tonmy" gun were a little faster and more accurate, and the net result was two dead enemy and one free American. S/Sgt Frohm's heroic behavior on the day just referred to has been typical of his conduct while engaged with enemy forces. His intrapidity and loyal devotion to duty merit great praise and exemplify the highest traditions of our Armed Forces.

2. Silver Star, contid.

- c. JAMES W. HUFFMAN, 33700090, Sergeent, Company "K", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 17 July 1944 in the vicinity of Gabbro, Italy. Sgt. Huffman, a squad leader, did by his heroic devotion to duty under intense enemy fire, maintain a dangerous outpost position and directed mortar fire on enemy . gets until while gallantly attempting to execute a difficult order he was seriously sounded. Sgt. Huffman tenaciously kept his squad in an outpost positon atop a rocky hill under intense mortar and artillyer fire and bullets while adjecent units were forced to with draw. Later Sgt. Huffman began directing mortar fire from and OP that was constantly harassed by enemy snipers. Unconcerned for his safety, Sgt. Huffman remained at this precariously dangerous position and calmly sent back his fire orders. While at this isolated post some six enemy stole up on Sgt. Huffman and threw several grenades at him. Thinking quickyl Sgt. Huffman opened up with his "Tommy" gun and routed them, wounding two or three. That evening Sgt. Huffman was given a mission of locating some enemy mortars. Despite the murderous concentrations of mortar and artillery fire that were falling around him, he crawled forward as he had been directed. On this mission Sgt. Huffman was badly wounded by some shell fragments. Sgt. Huffman's great bravery and stubborn desire to fulfill his assignment reflect great credit upon himself and on our Armed Forces and typify the spirit of loyalty found in our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Pittsburg, Pa.
- Regiment. For gallantry in action on or about 11 July 1944 in the vicinity of Rogignano, Italy. Pvt. Beck, did by his gallant conduct under heavy enemy fire help save the lives of several wounded comrades when his platoon was pinned down during an attack. When two of his comrades were wounded, Pvt. Beck, in the absence of medical aid men, then left his position of safety destite enemy artillery and in full view of enemy snipers, rendered first aid to the wounded men. After aiding these two men he courageously made his way about the area despite the heavy shelling it was being subjected to and checked to see that no other men needed first aid. Pvt. Beck then returned to his hole but before long left its cover again to fetch litter bearers for two men who were knocked out by the concussion of an exploding shell. Despite the efforts of enemy snipers to pick him off enroute, Pvt. Beck succeeded in bringing up the litter bearers and evacuating the unconscious men. Pvt. Beck's fearlessness and heroic devotion to his comrades in the face of grave danger reflect great credit on himself and are exemplary of the noble traditions of our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Kansas City, Missouri.
- e. CARLIN E. MORGAN, 0-1691737, 2nd Lieutenant, Company "I", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 23 May 1944 in the vicinity of Anzio, Italy. Lt. Morgan while a Staff Sergeant platoon guide did by his intrepidity in the face of grave danger other than to himself, save the lives of five comrades. When during an attack four of the men in his company wandered into a minefield, exploded some mines and thereby incurred serious injuries, Lt. Morgan gallantly spurmed any consideration for his own safety and went to their rescue. After rendering them first aid he guided litter bearers forward to evacuate the wounded men. However, so thickly sown with mines was this area that one of the litter bearers stepped on a mine and as also wounded. Lt. Morgan risked serious injury by going to this man's side giving him first aid and then evacuating him. By his great courage and skillful handling of a highly hazardous situation, Lt. Korgan reflected great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces and exemplifies that despite our enemy's ingenious devices for maiming and killing he cannot demoralize the American infantryman.

fo EDWIN N. ARNESON, 37027526, Staff Sergeant, Company "K", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 25 May 1944 in the vicinity of Velletri, Italy. S/Sgt Armeson, a platoon guide, assumed command of his platoon when his platoon leader and several other men became lost during an attack and performed a masterful job of combat leadership under the most trying conditions. First he accomplished a skillful reorganization of the platoon and then set out with two other men to seek the lost group. They daringly roamed many hundred hazardous yards behind the enemy lines, but were unable to find them. On returning to his platoon, Sgt. Arneson found they were under fire from a friendly unit to their rear. Bravely crawling through their machine gun fire, S/Sgt Arneson succeeded in getting them to cease their misguided efforts. He now received instructions to send forth a man on a contact mission. Unwilling to tire or expose any of his men, S/Sgt Armeson himself carried out this task and was forced to travel over a 1000 yards under enemy observation and sniper fire before accomplishing his mission. This time, S/Sgt. Armeson returned to his platoon to find them receiving a furious tank-infantry counter-attack. Although exhausted from his long march, S/Sgt Arneson, immediately began directing his men. They were able to force back the enemy tanks but still a large number of enemy infantry continued advancing despite all their efforts. Being on an isolated position, S.Sgt Armasonnow received orders to withdraw back to the company's main line. Sending his men back, S/Sgt Arneson intrepidly remained behind alone covering their withdrawal. He succeeded by his accurate fire to hold them off and killed at least four of them before he himself withdrew. S/Sgt Arneson's tireless efforts on behalf of his men and his great courage in the face of grave danger merit the greatest praise and are exemplary of the heroic heights that we traditionally achieve by our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Desart, North Dakota.

g. EARL A. SMITH, 39828971, Staff Sergeant, Company "K", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 26 May 1944 in the vicinity of Velletri, Italy. S/Sgt. Smith, a squad leader, did, by his heroic accomplishments while engaged with the enemy, enable his platoon to hold an isolated positoin without suffering excessive casualties. S/Sgt Smith first went on a dangerous mission many hundreds of yards behind the enemy's lines to seek some men who had become separated from the remainder of the platoon during an extremely aggressive advance. Unable to find the missing men Sgt. Smith returned to his platoon to find that an enemy machine gun in a field on their left flank was making things extremely uncomfortable for them. Ordering three men to cover him by their fire, S/Sgt Smith with great skill and courage maneuvered over a hundred yards of terrain affording little cover to within hand grenade range of the enemy nest. There, with two accurately thrown grenades, he neutralized the h hostile position killing the two men who were manning the gun. Not content to rest on his laurels, S/Sgt Smith on five other occasions that day left his platoon's position and made his way through heavy mortar fire to engage enemy snipers. By his accurate marksmanship he either killed or wounded them. S/Sgt Smith's gallantry in the face of enemy resistance and his utter disregard for his own safety merit the greatest praise and typify the highest traditions of our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Salt Lake City, Utah.

h. DOUGLAS M. DICKERSON, 34812959, Sergeant, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action on 3 June 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio Italy. Sgt. Dickerson did by his intrepidity succeed in knocking out a hostile machine gun nest that had been inflicting heavy casualties on his platoon. When his platoon become pinned down by the withering fire of an enemy gun, Sgt. Dickerson, exposing himself to the enemy's fire located the enemy's gun. Then, disregarding the great danger involved, Sgt. Dickerson courageously crawled forward some seventy-five yards through intense enemy machine gun and sniper fire. By skillfully employing his

grenade launcher Sgt. Dickerson then knocked out the enemy machine gun. Sgt. Dickerson's heroic action merits great credit for himself and our Armed Forces and exemplifies the traditional valor of the American Infantry. Entered military service from Birmingham, Alabama.

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- i. JOE H. KIMBLE, 0-1290435, Captain, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 1 July 1944 in the vicinity of Collemezzano, Italy. Capt. Kimble by the gallant and extremely skillful leadership of his company succeeded in beating back fierce enemy tank-infantry attacks against his company's position. When one of his platoon leaders was wounded and the men retreated in disorder, Capt Kimble left the safety of his CP and went forward assisting his non-commissioned officers to reorganize the platoon inspiring the men to retake the abandoned position. On his way back to the CP, Capt Kimble came upon a seriously wounded man and despite the heavy tank and machine gun fire that covered the area, he organized a litter aquad and led them to the wounded man. Back once again at his CP, Capt Kimble realized immediate action needed to be taken to stop the enemy's counter-attack which was growing in intensity and, despite his company's firepower against it, was relentlessly threatening his positions. Thinking and acting swiflty and with the calm confidence of a superb combat leader, Capt. Kimble withdrew his forward platoons, and called for artillery fire and skillfully and courageously brought it to within 100 yards of his company's positions. While directing the fire, a portion of the house he was in was knocked down by fire from tanks not over 300 yards away, but Capt. Kimble paying no heed for his own safety remained there throughout. As a result of Capt. Kimble's courage and tenacity the enemy counter-attack was smashed and his two platoons reoccupied their former positions. Capt. Kimble's heroic action and determination to hold his ground in the face of superior enemy numbers merit the greatest commendation and emphasizes the stubborn fighting spirit of the American Infantry.
 - k. NEAL RICHARDS, 34101390, Private First Class, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. For heroic achievement in action on 2 July 1944 in the vicinity of Collemezzano, Italy. Pfc Richards did by his complete disregard for his safety and his tremendous courage stop a Mark VI tank and forced it to withdraw. When his platonn's isolated position was attacked by a force of enemy tanks, Pfc Richards heroically patrolled the exposed flanks of his platoon and held back the armor of the enemy by the accuracy of his bazooka fire. Later when one tank succeeded in closing in on the platoon's position and was threatening to cut it to pieces, Ffc. Richards with heroic boldness engaged in a duel with the 60 ton of steel thundering towards them. Determined to stop the tank at any cost, he calmly fired an entire basic load of rockets at the menacing mechanical monster before he could stop it. But stop it he did, and by his great valor, his comrades were inspired to redouble their all ready super human efforts. By the combined bravery of Pfc. Richards and his comrades, they were able to hold their positions despite the enormous weight of armor the enemy continued to hurl at them. Pfc. Richards' herculean efforts and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces and exemplifies the supremacy of American "guts" over enemy steel. Entered military service from Moulton, Albama.
 - 1. CLOYD W. LEEPER, 37041873, Technical Sergeant, Company "B", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 31 May 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio, Italy. T/Sgt Leeper did by his heroic action under the most trying combat conditions enable his company to hold a dangerously exposed position. Under severe concentrations of mortar and artillery shells and intense machine gun fire, large numbers of his company withdrew from their postions in disorder leaving a 3.0 yard gap in their lines and exposing the left flank of the adjacent unit. T/Sgt Leeper realizing the great danger of such a situation if the enemy could counter-attack, exposed himself to the enemy's fire, gathered what men remained in the vicinity, and organized an outpost to inform his company CP of the situation but his radio destroyed by enemy shrapnel,

T/Sgt Leeper daringly traversed the heavily shelled route to the command post and delivered his information. He then returned to his joutpost and by the example he displayed of apparent fearlessness and tenacious devotion to duty, his badly shaken men were encouraged and inspired to remain on that isolated outpost almost a full day. T/Sgt Leeper's great bravery and inspiring leadership are worthy of great tribute and are examplary of the highest traditions of our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Lamoni, Iowa.

m. ROBERT H. LEWON, 33464898, Sergeant, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. Entered military service from Catawissa, Pennsylvania.

ANTHONY F. GELATIE, 31338747, Private, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. Entered military service from Bridgeport, Connecticut.

GAIL R. HOYT, 37538391, Private, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. Entered military service from McFall, Missouri.

For heroic achievement in action on 1 July 1944 in the vicinity of Collemezzano, Italy. Pvt. Gelatie did, as a member of a three man grenadier team, make a heroic stand in the path of a threatening Mark VI tank which forced the 60 ton monater to withdraw. When his platoon's open flank was in danger of being turned by a Mark VI tank, Pvt. Gelatie and two other grenadiers fearlessly made their way across termin raked by enemy tank, machine gun, and rifle fire to a position on the threatened flank. Here, realizing that upon them depended the lives of their platoon Pvt. Gelatie and his comrades disregarded their own personal danger. As the man oth steel monster roared down upon them, Pvt. Gelatie and his comrades heroically held their ground and calmly used their basic load of grenades at it. Their gigantic enemy was forced to withdraw in the face of their deadly fire, enabling their platoer to hold its position and saving them heavy casualties. Pvt. Gelatie's intense devotion to duty in the face of grave peril reflects the greates credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. The deed performed by him and his comrades proves again the superiority of our men and weapons over anything the enemy can hurl at us.

no CHARLES W. CAMPTON, 35697377, Private First Class, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on h July 19th in the vicinity of Rosignano, Italy. Pfc. Campton, a machine gumer, did by his heroic work wipe out a five man enemy patrol and frustate the attempts of an enemy counter-attacking force to penetrate the flank he was protecting. While his company was engaged in a fierce fire fight with the enemy, the latter laid down a terrific mortar barrage and wounded all the riflemen deployed around him. When the barrage lifted, Pfc. Campton saw advancing upon him a five man enemy patrol. Disregarding their blazing machine pistols, Pfc. Campton calmly opened fire with his machine gun and mowed them down, killing all of them. Pfc. Campton, despite the critical nature of his position without the protection of riflemen, gallently remained there alone and fired three boxes of ammunition into the ranks of the enemy during the counter-attack with deadly accuracy. The counter-attack which followed was successfully repulsed. Pfc. Campton's courageous and tenacious devotion to duty is exemplary of the fighting traditions of our Armed Forces and merits great commendation.

o. SALVATORE LOMANTO, 32749256, Sergeant, Medical Detachment, 135th Infantr Regiment. For gallantry in action from 29 May to 4 June 1944 in the vicinity of Campoleone, Italy.

During the battle for the Albano Hill positions, the casualties of the battalion were very high. Sgt. Lomanto volunteered time and time again to make trips with his vehicle to the forward positions to evacuate wounded men. The route he was required to travel was under direct observation and fire of the enemy snipers, machine guns, antitank guns and the enemy had several artillery impact areas along this route, making it extremely hazardous to travel during daylight. This voluntary and gallant action of Sgt. Lomanto's in the face of great personal danger speeded up evacuation of wounded, saving many lives and was inspiring to all who witnessed his actions. Entered service from Glaversville, New York.

p. RICHARD E. HUMPHREY, 32184024, Private First Class, Company "H", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action during the period 29 May to 4 June 1944 in the vicinity of Compoleone, Italy. During the battle for the Albano Hill positions the casualties of the battalion were very high. Pfc. Humphrey volunteered time and time again to make trips with his vehicle to the forward positions to evacuate mounded men. The route he was required to travel was under direct observation and fire of the enemy snipers, machine guns, antitank guns and the enemy had several artillery impact areas along this route, making it extremely hazardous to travel during daylight. This voluntary and gallant action of Pfc. Humphrey's in the face of great personal danger speeded up evacuation of wounded, saving many lives and was inspiring to all who witnessed his actions. Entered service from Jackson Heights, LI, New York.

q. DONALD S. HOAGLAND, 37027419, First Sergeant, Company "I", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 3 February 1944 in the vicinity of Cassino, Italy. 1st Sgt. Hoagland, did, by his great initiative and bravery, first save the lives of several of his wounded comrades and second, hold his company together in the face of a vile counter-attack thereby enabling them to beat back the enemy. After taking an enemy position, his company was caught in a very heavy mortar barrage and suffered many casualities. 1st Sgt. Hoagland did then, unhesitatingly, leave the comparative safety of his foxhole and, with mortar shells hitting within yards of him, assisted the company aid man in rendering first aid. The next tay, when the enemy counter-attacked, 1st Sgt. Hoagland indeed expose himself to intense small arms fire to hold in position some men who were about to draw back. Them, with the enemy within hand grenade distance, he made his way from foxhole to foxhole urging frightened men to fight, praising brave men and shooting it out with the enexy himself. 1st Sgt. Hoagland's gallant actions reflects great credit upon himself and his organization and his fighting spirit ranks him among the great fighting men of our Armed Forces. Entered military service from Hutchinson, Minnesota.

r. JOHN W. WATERS, Ihl29573, Sergeant, Company "B", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 2 April 1944 in the vicinity of Anzio, Italy. Sgt. Waters did fearlessly volunteer to lead a highly hazardous combat patrol with mission of knocking out two enemy machine guns three hundred yards beyond their own line. After advancing 150 yards the patrol was pinned down by a hail of histile fire. Sgt Waters determined to accomplish his mission, went forward alone. Although his helmet was riddled by bullets and knocked from his head, Sgt Waters daringly advanced to within 25 yards of the enemy guns and with rifle grenades knocked out one gun and caused the crew of the other to flee. The disturbance caused by Sgt. Water's activities started a tremendous deluge of fire pouring from the enemy positions in the vicinity. His problem was now to get his patrol back to their own lines without incurring casualties. Sgt. Waters promptly solved it by remaining alone in no men's land and gallantly accovering by fire the withdrawal of his men. Only when the last man had reached the safety of their lines did he withdraw. Sgt. Waters high devotion to duty and his great heroism in the face of grave danger reflect great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. His deeds exemplify the inspired fighting traditions of the American Infantryman. Entered military service from Austere, Georgia.

s. PAUL A. YOUNGHLOOD, 3h806571, Private First Class, Company "G", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 6 February 1944 in the vicinity of Cassino, Italy. Pfc. Youngblood did, when two of his platoon's BAR's break down during an attack, calmly and courageously repair and put them back into action while the enemy pelted him with hand grenades and tried to pick him off with machine gun and rifle fire. Supported by the fire power from these two weapons, Pfc. Youngbloods platoon was able to further prosecute the attack and take its objective. Later when the enemy fiercely counter-attacked Pfc. Youngblood, operating a BAR himself, continually exposed himself to their murderous fire as he sought the best firing positions from which to halt hostile penetrations. His great bravery resulted in his finally being wounded, but his fearlessness and aggressiveness in the face of great peril had enabled his platoon to accomplish its mission of taking and holding a difficult objective. Pfc Youngblood's gallantry and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces, and exemplifies the fighting tradition of our men in arms. Entered military service from Eroy, Alabama.

JAMES A. SOLLOMEN, 35919030, Private, Company "E", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 1 July 1944 in the vicinity of Collemenzano Italy. Pvt. Sollomen did by his gallantry in the face of great peril stop an enemy tank that was threatening to overrun his platoon's position. When an enemy tank attacked his platoon's position and the regular bazooka man found himself unable to fire it because he had lost his eyeshield, Pvt. Sollomen unhesitatingly went into action. Exposing himself to the direct observation of the enemy and the raking machine gun and rifle fire, Pvt. Solloment loaded the bazooka and prepared to fire at the massive steel monster rearing towards him. Ignoring the grave consequences of firing his weapon without face protection and determined to stop his 10 ton adversary at any cost, Pvt. Sollomen scored a direct hit and stopped the threatening tank. As a result of his extremely heroic stand, Pvt. Solloemn was severely blinded by the blast of the rocket and had to be evacuated for medical treatment. Pvt. Sollomen's intrepidity without concern for his own safety reflects great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces and demonstrates once more that our valiant American Infantryman are more than capable of dealing with our enemy's men and steel. Entered service from Cleveland, Dhio.

u. WILBUR R. COONS, 32931023, Technician Fourth Grade, Medical Detainment, 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 2h March 19hh in the vicinity of Campomorto, Italy. Tech Coons did by his great bravery and complete contemps on his own safety save the lives of two badly wounded men. During a battalion movement, the battalion S-3 and his messenger walked into a mine field and were seriously wounded. Tech Coons heard their cries, and although the night was very dark and the slightest misstep might have been fatal, he courageously probed a path to them and administered immediate first aid. The then evacuated the wounded from the mine field. Tech Coons by his gallant action saved the lives of these two men as they were bleeding very badly when he reached their side. His deed reflects great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. He lieterally stepped forward where Angels would have feared to tread and exemplified the great traditions of the American soldier. Entered military service from Fort Niagar, New York.

v. EDWIN K. TURNER, 32012512, Technical Sergeant, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 3 June 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio Italy. T/Sgt Turner, a platoon guide, did, when all other available leaders became casualties, unhesitatingly, assume command of two platoons and gallantly exposed himself to intense enemy fire to lead them.

When, during an attack on strong enemy positions, Sgt. Turner's platoon and the platoon on his left suffered heavy casualties, Sgt. Turner reorganized these two platoons, arranged the evacuation of their casualties and directed the fire of a tank destroyer to knock out three hostile machine guns which were raising havor with them. Thus, when the enemy counter-attacked, Sgt. Turner's platoons were by his inspiring and skillful leadership able to beat back the enemy. Then, to round out his day of heroic endeavour, Sgt. Turner went forward and drew the fire of an enemy machine gun so that it could be located and knocked out. Sgt. Turner's coolness and courage in the face of great peril and the heroic heights he achieved in his first test as a leader reflect great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces and typifies the great traditions of the American soldier. Entered military service from Portland, Maine.

- w. JALES E. WICKER, 3509339h, Private, Company "M", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 1 June 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio, Italy. Pvt. Wicker a machine gunner, did by courageously remaining at his gun during a fierce counterattack prevent the enemy from enveloping his battalion's open left flank. Although heavy mortar and machine gun fire forced the adjacent riflemen to withdraw leaving Pvt. Wicker virtually isolated, Pvt. Wicker disregarded the grave danger involved and caimly stuck by his gur. Again and again the enemy swarmed toward him and each time he sent a hail of withering machine gun fire into their ranks forcing them back. Several times some of the enemy came close enough to throw hand grenades at him but Pvt. Wicker, undismayed and with heroic determination, drove them back. Inspired by Pvt. Wicker's gallant stand, the riflemen later regrouped and resumed their original positions. By this time Pvt. Wicker had by himself killed at least 10 of the enemy, had wounded many others and have prevented the battalion's flank from being turned. Pvt. Wicker's bravery and loyal devotion to duty reflect the greates credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. His fearlessness in the face of almost overwhelming odds exemplifies the fighting traditions of the American Infantry. Entered military service from Greenville, Indiana.
- x. EDWARD J. BURGER, 37026569, Staff Sergeant, Company "I", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 30 May 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio, Italy. Sgt. Burger, a squad leader, did, by gallantly exposing himself to grave danger, save the life of a wounded comrade. His platoon had been stopped in their attack upon an enemy position by heavy machine gune and artillery fire and pinned down in an extremely exposed position. When one of his men was seriously wounded, Sgt. Burger with utter disregard for his own safety, crawled 50 yards through a hail of hostile machine gun fire and dragged the wounded man to a position of safety. Here he rendered him first aid and dug a slit trench to protect the man until he could be evacuated. Inspired by Sgt. Burger's bravery, his comrades later resumed their attack and took their objective. During this attack, however, Sgt. Burger was himself seriously wounded. Sgt. Burger's great cour ge and his heroic devotion to a wounded comrade exemplify the fine traditions of our Armed Forces and reflect great credit upon himself and his organization. Entered service from Duluth, Minnesota.
- y. RUSSELL R. LARSON, 20707036, Private First Class, Headquarters Company, 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 8 February 19th in the vicinity of Cassino, Italy. Pfc. Larson, although twice wounded, refused to retire from an attack until his unit's objective was taken. After medical attention had been given he returned to his unit and standing atop a wall in the face of intense rifle, machine gun and mortar fire as well as hand grenades, calmly inflicted several casualties, captured intact and enemy machine gun and took a German prisoner. Later under perfect observation, he again exposed himself to heavy enemy fire to break up an enemy supply train, killing one man and two mules.

Pfc. Larson remained on the hill until ordered to seek medical attention for three idditional wounds. His gallant deeds in the face of heavy enemy fire reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Minneapolis, Minnesota.

z. HARVEY W. RITTER, 337195633 , Private First Class, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 26 April 1944 in the vicinity of Carano, Italy. Pfc. Ritter, although himself severely wounded, did by gallant action save the lives of four badly wounded men and direct the saving of several others. While leading a squad on a combat patrol, Pfc. Ritter and all the members of his squad Were caught in a mortar and artillery barrage and wounded. Despite the intense pain of his own wound, Pfc. Ritter, directed the walking wounded to their own lines, carried one man himself and personall organized and led a litter party to carry in Although this necessitated several trips 400 yards into "no his other wounded . mans land" and exposed him to enemy sniper, artiller; and mortar fire, Ffc Ritter showed not the slightest concern for his own safety, and refused to cease his own rescue activities until all his men were rescued. Finally his platoon leader seeing how badly his leg was bleeding and the difficulty with which he was walking, ordered him the the Bn. aid station. Pfc. Ritter's heroic devotion to his wounded comrades and his determination and courage reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces. Entered military service from Finkesburb, Maryland.

SILVER STAR, (Posthumous)

as GENE S. HALEHT, 20718589, Private, Medical Detachment, 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 3 June 1944 in the vicinity of Lanuvio, Italy. Pvt. Haight, a medical aid man, did, in the face of heavy enemy machine gun fire, bravely make his way forward to render first aid to the wounded of his plation. Arriving at the platoon's position he immediately began working on the wounded, paying no attention to the heavy machine gun and mortar fire the enemy was throwing upon the area. A fragment from one of these mortar shells finally killed Fvt. Haight. His gallant work that day will never be forgotten. Were it not for him, several of his wounded comrades would not have survived. Pvt. Haight's heroism exemplifies the great tradition of the American soldier. All the men of his battalion will ever be proud to say that Pvt. Haight served with them in their great cause. Intered military service fro Maquocata, Iowa.

b/ OSCAR B, BRUBAKER, 33232515, Technical Sergeant, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 2 June 19th in the vicinit of Lamvio Italy. T/Sgt Brubaker did, while leading an infantry platoon, succeed in carrying our a highly hazardous mission at the cost of his own life. He gallantly led his platoon through a thousand yards of hell in the form of heavy enemy machine gunand mortar fire. Atthogu hit in the hand by a hostile bullet, he carried on, determined to take his assigned objective and, thereby, secure the flank of a battalio that was to attact later. He succeeded in taking this objective. However, while organizing a defensive setup to embble his pla oon to hold their hard won ground, he was forced to continual expose himself to the fire of an enemy machine gun and was killed. But T/Sgt Brubaker's extreme sacrifice was in vain for his platoon held the ground they had gained under his inspired leadership and the battlion whose flank they were helping to protect was able to move forward and destroy large numbers of the enemy. T/Sgt Brubaker's fearless devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and our Armed Forces. His comradeswill ever remember him as a great soldier. Entered military service from Thompsontown, Pennsylvania.

SECTION IN - WARRATIVE RISTORY FOR THE MORTH OF AUGUST

All units of the regiment were in the rest area in the vicinity of Castigioncello on the first of the month and the various companies had the most protracted rest period since the beginning of the Itslian campaign.

Various forms of recreation were organized. The beach was cleared by the engineers for swimming, and numerous ball games were played within the regiment, as well as other sports. Movies were shown each evening in the regimental area and nearby the Red Cross set up a recreation center in a park. The Red Cross provided a snack bar where coffee, cold drinks and cookies were served, and other tents provided facilities for reading, writing letters and listening to the radio. Sports events were also arranged in this area, and USO shows as well, both in the afternoon and evening. In the divisional area other shows were presented, including a concern by Lily Pons, of the Metropolitan Opera Company.

Many of our men were present at Division when the frime Minister of England, Mr. Winstor Churchill, inspected troops and gave a brief address.

A limited training program was put into effect after the regiment had been given the opportunity to enjoy a complete est.

On August 22 the regiment moved forward to an area in the vicinity of Castelfioren tino where a regular training schedule was instituted and continued throughout the remainder of the month. LOTTINY

BECTION IV - HARRATIVE HISTORY FOR THE HORTH OF BIRTHELR 1944

The month of September was to find the 135th Regiment in the fulfillment of another important role, that of playing a vital part in the penetration and breaking of the enemy's heavily fortified withing Line. This historic achievement marked the anniversary of a year's combat in Italy and nearly two and one-half year's overseas duty for the Regiment.

The 135th Regiment, still in the area of Castelfiorentino on the first of the month, remained in that vicinity for four days during which time Lieutenant General Mark W. Clark, commander of the Fifth Army, personally presented awards and promotions to a number of officers and enlisted men. The Regiment, utilizing this period for mountain training and the practice of attacks coordinated with armor, then moved to a bivouac area on the southern outshirts of Florence and on Beptember 8 the Regiment proceeded to Sesto Fiorentino, a northeastern suburb of Florence.

In September 11 the Regiment moved toward an assembly area near larberino (787940), a vicinity that was subjected to solutioned enemy artillery fire, and on the following day the Becond and Third Lattalions went forward and passed through the 168th Infantry. It was a day of severe losses for the Third Battalion for as the unit! collecting group moved forward into an assembly area an enemy Shu-ine field was encountered and the Battalion Commander, Lieutenant Colonel Herry Y. MoSween, was seriously injured by a mine. Attempts to sid his were hampered by more mines being expluded, injuring Captair mather had Boty, Gr., 3-3; First Lieutenant Jake Gabbard, heavy vespons commander, and First Lieutenant Leslie K. Vensel, commander of Josephy "I". Lieutenant Colonel McSween, who lost a foot when the mine exploded, ordered that no one approach them and that the men turn back and by pass the mine field. This courageous action undoubtedly saved any lives.

The losses in battalion leadership on the eve of pattle were heenly felt because of the experience and leadership of those officers. Hajor Allison Conrad, the Third Lattalion executive officer, temporarily assumed command of the Battalion until Lieutenant Colonel John u. Joyce was sent to replace Lieutenant Colonel Hodween.

The Battalions were moving forward on the 12 in the face of stiff opposition. Artillery fire was quite heavy but this was countered effectively by fire from our sup orting battaries. The Lecond well third Battalions were leading the attack and on the 13 it was lear ed from prisoners that the Regiment had excountered the outposts of the Gothic Line.

It was learned, too, that this sector was being defended by Berman units of the Fourth Paratroop Division. In one instance "L" Company ran into pillboxes at the case of Hill 568 (779989) and hand granades were exchanged at close range. Several TOT shoots were carried out with satisfactory results. All companies were able to keep moving, the Third Battalion running into strong opposition. Enemy artillery fire increased but the battalions were sided by effective counter-battery fire. Or September 14 the Second and Thid Battalions pushed forward, the former having as its objective Hill 565 (763985). While advancing, considerable sutomatic weapons fire Was thrown out by the enemy. The First Battalion passed through the Second and the Third Battalion opened a second attack against Hill 671 (773995), where the enemy had managed to hold out the previous day. Casualties ran high for our troops as well as the enemy, Campany "I" alone losing 18 men wounded and five killed, primarily through mortar and machine gun fire.

The Third Battalion was not to be denied its objective and advanced under a rolling barrage. In one group of houses at Largnano (784981) a hand to hand fight developed with extensive use of grenades. This engagement was won largely through the efforts of Second Lieutenant Thomas W. Wigle who, although mortally wounded, continued to hurl hand grenades at the enemy, and shout words of encouragement to his men. Inspired by this heroic leadership, they moved in to clean out the strongpoint. Rill 671 was completely occupied by the next day. The German paratroopers had displayed their tradition is stubborn resistance and had made good use of extensive mine fields, 'arbed wire and emplacements. Some of the emplacements on the forward slopes were of concrete and it took direct hits from heavy calibre artillery to knock them out. With the capture of this mountain wasition, the Gothic Line had been penetrated and the enemy had been handed a good beating. The Regiment was meeting the main defense of the Bothic Line and before the First Battalion jumped off in the direction of Mangona (758991) a lengthy artillery parrage, including heavy guns, was laid down with excellent results. The enemy also was employing fairly heavy artillery on our front line units.

The Gothic Line defenses had been discussed many times of the past with prisoners of war who consistently pointedout and stressed its formidable nature. They brazenly stated that it was the line which would prevent the Allies from getting into the Po River Valley, and it was the line on which Hitler had ordered the Allied drive northward in Italy stopped. All available intelligence indicated that the major undertaking on hand would require a maximum of shill, cooldination and aggressivness in order to make a successful penetration of this defensive line.

The Gothic Line positions in the vicinity of Futa Pass, which the Regiment was flanking from the west, were as staunch and formidable as had been expected.

The selection of commanding heights with tortuous and precipitous approaches had been scientifically welded into a defensive line with all the expertness acquired by the enemy high command throughout their long defensive campaign in Italy. To increase the effectiveness of the forbidding terrain, the enemy had commandeered and organized through hos "organization Todt", Italian civilian labor to erect in dominating positions of steel and concrete pillboxes and gun positions. Dense mine fields and barbed wire obstacles had been interwoven among the defenses. Now, after being ably assisted with heavy air and artillery preparations, the Regiment was fighting the enemy from within his main bastion in the Bothic Line.

The mountainous terrain was presenting problems of supply and mule pack trains offered the only means of transporting the much-needed food and ammunition. In many instances rations were delayed for a considerable period of time due to the fact that the mules could not climb the steep cliffs. Casualties had to be carried to the rear for medical treatment. Another serious problem was the maintenance of communication lines.

The First and Second Battalions resumed the attack on September 16, the plan calling for the First to move north and then block to the northeast, the Second to move from the vicinity of Mill 650 (779014) to the northeast and block in that direction. From these positions the 168th infantry was to pass through and attack to the north est. A steady advance was made on that day and continued on the 17 despite mine fields, barbed wire entanglements and small arms fire. Fireteen German tanks were located in a draw by the First Lattalion and "G" Company. Artillery fire was laid down in that locality with disasterous effects on the German armor.

Another grevious loss was suffered by the Regiment when Captain Joe Mimble of "E" Company was killed by a sniper, He has been a corstant inspiration to his men through his valient and intelligent leadership in both the Morth African and Italian campaigns. He had been prisonally decorated with the Distinguished pervice Cross by Seneral Clark, and for his brave and courageous deeds also had been awarded the bilver Star.

The Third Dattalion, moving up to Migneto on September 18 following a 30-minute artillery preparation, ran into a heavy enemy counterattack at Hill 749 (772026) and a fierce fire fight followed. The
attack having failed, the Battalion was ordered to hold the ground
for the night. The First Battalion also was encountering stiffened
opposition, mainly enemy machine gun fire and mortar fire. Our troops
were extremely fatigued, having had little sleep in the past 72 hours,
and the supply problem continued to grow even more acute. The mules
could hardly make their way over the trails and the company mades
frequently lost their way because of the darkness and myriad paths.

On September 19 the enemy increased his fire from machine guns, mortars and artillery and "E" Company, caught in a concentration, reported heavy casualties. The fighting was becoming increasingly bitter with grenades exchanged in close combat. Forty-nine prisoners were taken by our troops in 24 hours. On the next day the Second Battalion reported that it was encountering mine fields and bt was not until September 21 that wounded from "F" Company were evacuated from the area and "G" Company was able to work around the field. Engineers were used to clear a path through the mine field in order that caves in the vicinity could be searched and on September 22 the Regiment was moving forward again at a slow pace. Among 11 FM's taken on September 23 were two members of an artillery observation team, captured with their radio intact.

It was a day to day, hill to hill fight against an enemy determined to exact as high a price as possible before relinquishing the gateway to the Po Valley of northern industrial Italy. Our men had to root the Hermans out of each pillbox and dugout and were constantly harrassed by sniper fire from all sides. Many unipers let our troops pass through and then opened up from the rear. Our advance was of necessity slow, preceded by much careful probing of the terrain, a task that taxed the endurance of every man. We were making use of flame throwers against some enemy positions. The Germans in their determination to cling to the mountains were throwing in engineering and air corps elements to supplement and replace those on the line.

As the Regiment advanced it was necessary to put into effect very stringent traffic regulations because the narrow roads would permit one-way vehicular movement only in many places. The Germans complicated this by their many demolitions requiring the construction of bypasses and bridges.

Reports from prisoners on September 24 were to the effect that the enemy was withdrawing at several points because of the constant pressure against him and his heavy losses in men and material. At Roncobilaccio, it was learned, about 100 Germans withdrew, leaving large quantities of material in the town. Two enemy 105 mm. artillery pieces were surrounded by our troops and could not be withdrawn by the enemy. Buy most German soldiers were putting up a stiff, fanatical fight before being killed or taken prisoner.

On September 26 and 27 the Third Dattalion launched attacks against the town of Druscole and reached their objective at 0900 on the 27. The First Battalion, meeting little opposition, took over Fratte (302082) and then went on to enter Belvedere (808085) on the right and Casellacco (793086) on the left. Progress was glow.

Laneral Lolte informed Colonel Manhart that he wanted the First Sattalion on Lt. Bastione (813113) as soon as possible and on the following morning, despite rain, wind and increasing cold, this was ac published. The Third Battalion was moving forward without opposition. With the fall of Mt. Bastione, the Second Battalion was committed through the First Battalion to exploit the successes gained. Energising a vigorous and aggressive drive, the Becond Battalion alvanced 1,500 yards past their objective to the vicinity of Fornelli (808165).

Con deptember 29 the 168th Infantry had passed through the Relment. The Third Battalion was assembled at Bruscoli and the First and becond Battalions were in the vicinity of Castell Del Alpi (825145). The Resignent had passed into Divisional reserve. The Bothic Line had been pierced over the mountains of the Apennines that held every advantage for the defenders who had boasted to the civilian population that from this vantage point they would "run the Americans back to Rome".

The Regiment remained in Division reserve for the remainder of the month. During this time the companies were issued a new type field jacket, sleeping bags, shoe packs, wool sweaters and winter underwear. Hot meals were served, a beer ration issued and the men were paid.



A. THE FOLIOWING HARED OFFICERS AND EVELIGIED HER FAVE BEEN AWARDED THE DECCRATIONS AND AWARDS AS INDICATED BELOW:

1. Silver Star

- a. PHILIP R. HAMPE, 13184671, Sergeant(then Corporal), Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 6 July 1944, in the vicinity of Rosignano, Italy. During an advance on enemy positions, 3gt Hampe and a commade discovered a long narrow trench covered and camouflaged on top but open at either end. Although subjected to intense enemy mortar and small arms fire from other enemy entranchments, 3gt Hampe crawled to one end of the dug-out and his commade to the other. Firing into the dug-out, 3gt Hampe wounded one of the enemy soldiers who crawled out and surrendered. At the same time, 3gt Hampe's commade entered the dug-out from the other end and firing his rifle, caused 17 dazed enemy troops to flee toward 3gt Hampe, who promptly took them prisoner and disarmed them. The heroic courage and determination of 3gt Hampe enabled the platoon to continue its successful attack. Entered military service from Fittsburgh, Pa.
- b. JAMES F. GARFIELD, 0370002, Captain, Company "6", 155an Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action from 1 to 14 February 1944, in the vicinity of Cassino, Italy. Commanding a rifle company, Cap'. Garfield by his fearless leadership and personal bravery mabled his men to take important ground from the enemy and hold it despite warflerce counter-attacks. For two weeks he and his men closed with a stubborn enemy who constantly pounded their positions with artiller. mortar, machine gun and sniper fire. Although wounded, Capt Parfield refused treatment and remained, fighting side by side with his wan. to one occasion he saved the life of a badly wounded man by carrying him out of an area raised by hostile rechine pun fine and securing quick medical attention for him. Although their numbers dwindled from a fall strength company to a more handful, and despite the miserable reacher they were experiencing, Capt Sarfield Rept the morals of his purist hi h level and so won the respect and admiration of this heroic bandled that they would have continued find ting had he given the order, even after they were to be relieved. Capt Sarfield's action was in keepin with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from kinneapolis, Kinnesota.
- Infantry Reviment. For mallantry in action on 8 July 1944, in the vicinity of magicanano, Italy. When intense enemy mortar and machine and advanced with the intention of inacking out the enemy machine and bespite a withering hail of hootale builtets, Sgt Bray polled for him to join him. Inspired by Sgt Bray's courage, the men inholded. Althous everely wounded in the right leg, Sgt Bray, by crawling forward, directed his BAR team to a position from where they were able to pour murderous flanking fire on the enemy, forcing six of them to surrend and the rest to withdraw. The outstanding leadership and determination desplayed by Sgt Bray enabled his platoon to gain their object. Entered military service from Fresno, California.

d. JOSEPH E. CHANFORD, 35301144, Technical Sergeant, Company "C", 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 4 July 1944, in the vicinity of Rosignano, Italy. When the rest of his Company was held up, Sgt Crawford led his BAR team through intense artillery and mortar fire and occupied a house on the Company's objective. The enemy counter-attacked and although Sgt Crawford and his squad fired rifle trenades, the BAR, and threw hand grenades, the enemy continued their advance and threatened to overrun the company. Realizing the need for more fire power, Sgt Crawford dashed across the exposed terrain and secured a light machine gun, put it into action and drove the enemy back. While the company was organizing a defensive position Sgt Crawford remained in the house and directed artillery fire although enemy shells scored two direct hits on the building. The course cous determination displayed by Sgt Crawford was a key factor in the success of the entire operation. Entered military service from Cincinnati, Chio.

e. FRED H. LIPPUCCI, 0359982, Major, Regimental Headquarters, 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action on 3 June 1944, in the vicinity of lanuvio, Italy. When the Regimental CP convoy was subjected to enemy machine gun and artillery fire, Major Lippucci quieted the men, guided them to covered positions and directed the removal of three of the vehicles. With an enlisted man, major Lippucci attempted to reach three wounded men but each time they were forced back by intense bursts of enemy machine and and machine pistol life. Major Lippucci then traversed several hundred yards of road swept by machine gun fire and an open field shelled by enemy artillery and montar fire to contact a company of friendly tanks. He then coordinated a combined tank and infantry attack that succeeded in driving the enemy from the hill which they were holder. The courageous leadership displayed by Major Lippucci was a key factor in the entire successful operation. Entered military service from Morgantown, West virginia.

2. <u>Silver Star</u> (Posthumously)

a. GENES. HAIBHT, 20718539, Private, Aedical Detachment, 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallentry in action on 3 June 1944; in the vicinity of lanuvio, Italy. Durin an attach on enemy positions, the company to which Pvt Height was attached as madical-aid man surfers heavy casualties as a result of heavy enemy fire. The third platfor lost contact with the rest of the company and was isolated for percent hturs. Pvt Height, learning of the situation, in ediately left the interest of and crossed 500 yards of open terrain, raised by enemy inactine on fire, in order to contact the platform. Upon reaching the platform, he immediately remered first-aid to the counded and arranged for their evacuation. Despite the sniper and machine gun fire, he refused to seek cover for himself. When the enemy threw in a heavy concentration of morter fire, Pvt Height was hit by a shell fragment and instantly billed. The courage and devotion to his compades saved several lives, and his actions gained for him the respect and admiration of all who observed him. Entered military service from Haqueteta, lowa. Text of him: Ers. Mollie Height (Mother), 311 South Second Street, Aaqueteta, lowa.

2. Silver Star cont'd. (Posthumously)

- b. 'HARCLD LIPSKY, 32790409, Private First Class, Company "C" 135th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action of 4 July 1944, in the vicinity of Resignano, Italy. When leading the advance of his platoon, Pfc Lipsky was fired on by two enemy machine guns. Returning their fire, he hit one of the gumners and caused the remaining members of the crew to flee from their position. Meanwhile heavy artillery and mortar fire forced his platoon to withdraw. Being in direct view of the remaining hostile gun, Pfc Lipsky played deed until dark and than crept back to his position. Although exhausted by his efforts, h led his platoon forward to knock out the machine gun that had kept him binned down all day. As a result of Pfc Lipsky's heroic determination the platoon was able to move forward without incurring casualties and occupy important commanding ground. The following day he received a direct hit from an artillery shell and was immediately killed. exemplary actions of Pfc Lipsky gained for him the respect and admiration of his entire organization. Entered military service from Bronx, New York. Next of kin: Mrs. Anna Lipsky (Mother), 600 Timpson Place, Bronx, New Mork.
- c. FAY L. CLEEK, 35133634, Sergeant, Company "A", 135th Infantry Reciment. For callantry in action on 12 February 1944, in t vicinity of Abbe di Monte Cassino, Italy. Sat Cleek led his scuad a steep, rocky hill, through heavy mortar and aftillery fire to within 50 yards of an enemy strong-point which was their objective. Suddenly the crossfire of four enemy machine guns and increased mortar fire forced Sat Cleek and his man to seek cover behind a stone wall. Reslizing that sooner or later they would receive a direct hit from the heavy mortar fire, Sgt Cleek, instead of taking the simpler alternative of withdrawing, ju ped over the wall and charged towards the enemy. Before he could advance very far, he fell, mortally wounded. His men, however, inspired by his callantry, immediately attacked and drave out the enemy, erabling their company to make a rapid advance. The obvious bravery and determination displayed by Spt Cleak gained for him the respect and admiration of all who observed him. Entered military serv from New Castle, Indiana. Next of kin: Mrs. Elsie Cleek (Nother). Route 1, New Castle, Indiana.
