TH LANDING AT ALC. IA

on 18 Outober 1942 Companies I, K, L, an attached platoon from Co. Mand one officer and 16 E.M. from the Med. Det., 135th Inf were placed of detached service at SUNNYLANDS CAMP, CARRICKFURGUS, North Ireland, with Lt. Col. Edwin T. SWENSON in Command. Capt William F. SMELLMAN, Capt Velhelm JOHNSON (MC), lat Lt Dmory J. TRAINICK, lat Lt Robert O. FOUTER and 2nd Lt. George GUORGE also accompanied these units in addition to their full complement of Company Officers. At this camp the Bn. was equipped and organized for combat, predicated on the space available for transporting them to the scene of operations. Administrative personnel and equipment were not included to give maximum space for combat person el, in view of the fact that only two destroyers were available for the operations. During the time spent at SUNNYLANDS CAMP, troops were train in boarding and disembarking from destroyers, and practice operations against the dock area of BELFAST.

On 21 October 1942, 3 officers and 24 E. M. embarked form BELFAST, North Ireland on the British Destroyer H.M.J. MALCOIM, and H.M.J. BROKE, all heavy weapons personnel with the exception of one officer. On 76 October the balance of the force, 21 officers and 613 E. W. boarded the British Cruiser SHEFFIELD and put out to sea with a large troop concoy. During the voyage the plans of operation were worked out by Capt FAN: WI (R.N.), Lt Comdr SHARS (R.N.), Lt Col STENSON, Capt SNELLMAN, the three Company Condrs and the Communications Officer. This Bn was to operate with and under the command of the British Navy, and was know as the TER'INAL FORCE. The mission of this force was to break the boom stretc! ed across the harbor entrance at ALGIERS, ALGERIA, North Africa, land, and secure the port and shipping facilities against sabotage. This operation was to be executed simultaneously and in cooperation with the main American and Dritich landing of the MASTORN AUGATOR PORCE just WIST of ALGIERS. The to the foot that the ship was to put into GIBRALT. for one day it was impossible to risk disclosure of the destination and

put out to sea at GIBRAIT'R each officer and key non-commissioned offic was given a map, and a copy of the proved plan, and coordination and ironing out of details commenced. Elternate plans also were studied.

On 7 November 1942, at 16.0 hours to destroyer N.N.S. NALCOTAL came along-side the Traiser WETTIND, and the Dorce detailed to go on the vessel transferred at sea without incident. The force detailed to go or the destroyer H.M.S. PROVID transferred in a like manner immediately afterward. The transfer at sea was completed at 1730 hours. It Col. WENCON and Capt FANCOUT accompanied the force on the T.M.S. BROKE which was commanded by combourd (R.N.). Morale and discipling here excellent. The night was very dark, the sky slightly overcest, and visibility fair.

At 0220 8 November 1942 a message was received from Capt PANCOUNT stating that the landings of the Combat Terms of the MASTERN ASSAULT FOR .. had been successful and that the force was to go in. Capt MC -Culloch was instructed to get all men in readiness. The two destroyers steemed for approximately an hour toward the port. On nearing the port gun flashes were seen along the coust, but flot from the port of AAGIERS batteries. Searchlights on the ILUT DE MARINE and at battery DES ARCADI began to nearth the harbor to seaward. As the lights went off it became more difficult to make out where the boom wan located. The destroyers proceeded forward on what was thought to be the right course, and the battery DLS ARCADIN opened fire on M.M.S. MALCOLM. On approaching the boom it was realized that the ships were heading outside the JITTE DE MUJIAFHA, so they turned segward for another try. H.M.S. HALCO " following H.M.S. BROTT out. On the second try the boom was missed again, and the H.W.S. BLOKE was under fire of the batteries of both W.S. ARC D (and JUTTE DU NORD. Capt FARCOUR signaled H. J.C. " COOM to go in if it could. H.M.S. AKIBOM also missed, end on turning remaind receive several direct lits from shore butteries. Fire broke out amidahips and the MALCOLM sent a mesoage to Capt TMCOULT that she was badly hit,

could make only four knots an hour, and consequently was withdrawing.

The heroism of 2nd lt William MUIR, Co L, 135th Inf, who was on the MALCOLM, was recognized in the following letter received by him:

"Sir, I am commanded by My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to inform you, that the King has been graciously pleased to approve the mention of your name in Despatches, for your bravery on passage to North Africa as a Ninth U. S. Army officer who was attached to boarding partie in the H.M.S. MALCOIM, when you jettisoned burning ammunition containers set on fire by enemy guafire. The Certificate will be sent to you in due course. I am Sir, Your Obedient Servant, N. V. MARKHAM, Officer of the Secretary of the Admiralty."

Lt MUIR, later promoted to Captain, decorated wath the Silver Star for his bravery and initiative under fire in TUNISIA, died in the hospital in Italy on 29 October 1943 of Malaria and Jaundice.

Capt MC CULLOCH was informed that the H.M.S. BROKE was going in alone and he relayed instructions for Plan "B" covering that eventuality. The BROKE proceeded in for the third time and received seemingly greater fix from the shore batteries, but missed the entry again and turned back to sea. Surprise was out of the question now and it was becoming daylight. Therefor it was decaded to take BASIN DU MUSTAPHA, including the GRAND MOLE, and the destroyer went in for the fourth try, the shore batteries pounding away. Fire was returned form the ship. It seemed likely to miss again, but Comdr LAYARD altered the course, and ordered increased speed. The ship cut through the boom with hardly a sensation of hittin and proceeded toward the quay. The quay at which it had planned to land was filled with ships, so H.M.S. BROKE berthed next to the QUAY DE FALA! on MOLE LOUIS BILLIARD. Terrific machine gun fire was encountered from a small vessel in port, and OERLIKONS aboard the BROKE shot up the vesse considerably, silencing the fire. A number of the Naval personnel aboat the BROKE were wounded by machine fun fire which seemed to be comparable to our .50 Caliber. Some machine gun fire was received form the warehouses and ships in the harbor, and the Naval personnel returned fire

with the Oerlikons which neemed to silence the enemy guns.

The troops on board H.H.S. Broke were quite shaken by the bombardmen and were a little slow in getting under way to disembark, however the platoon leaders got their men off and proceeded to their objectives. The landing was completed in broad daylight at 0520 hrs. Small arms fire wa directed at the troops from various parts of the city, and automatic fir covered open places and streets. The amount of fire directed at our troops lessened considerably, and the situation began to look favorable. At about 0800 hrs. two policemen and two civilisms come over to the American forces stating that they wished to have an emissary go into the city to make arrangements for taking over the City of 'lgiers. this was being discussed a British Havel officer, one of the boarding party commanders, came back and stated that a French army officer had contracted him and told him that the landing forces were about to be surrounded and annihilated, let it be understood that they were definite against cooperation. Befor there was time to weigh the merits of this information, artillery fire was received form the direction of JETTE du NORD. The third round went through the bow of the BROKE and the commander backed the Destroyer alongside the QUAY de DUNKIR, WE. Fire was covering the areas between the forces on land and the ship, with the radio broken there was no communication bo be had. Shortly after this the Battery des ARCAD S began ranging on H.M.S. BROKE. After six round had resulted in five direct hits the BROKE signaled by siren for recall but the men in the erec were not permitted to go to her. It was abviou that the ship would have to leave port immediately or be sunk. It was 09 0 hrs. and the combat teams of he Esstern Assault force, advancing from the west should be nearing the city, as the general plan had set forth. Terhaps the rosition could be held. The destroyer steemed out of the Algiers harbor only one torpedoed and stuck as it resolved the outer harbor.

base seemed to be continuing the fight but there was no report from the platoons to the left in the direction of BRIXE LAMES Est. The area soull of the warehouse on MOLE LOUIS BILLIARD where there were large piled of sand, wood and baled straw was organized for defense. The outer perimeter was organized so that no one could get within hand greenade rank this point Pfc. Helvin Lein of the Med. Det. learned of he location of a wounded officer. Disregarding heavy M.G. fire which cut across he path Pfc. Lein went to the officer and rendered emergency treatment. Started back to his post and was killed by enemy machine gun fire. Le was awarded the D.S.C. posthumously.

At 1100 hrs. six allied planes came over and bombed JETTE du NORD, destroying these batteries. Artillery fire could than come from only direction and preparations were made accordingly. Shortly, armored we hicles were reported approaching and men were placed in favorable posions to fire anti-tank grenades. Three tanks commenced circling the armodylecting the troops to crossfire from 37mm and machine guns. A grounder S/Sgt. Robert Rooney had to pass a street intersection subjected to heavy MG fire from two directions. Sgt. Rooney saw Pvt. Lawrence Fonder, one of his men fall wounded in the danger zone, he returned an carried the man to safety. For saving the life of his comrade Sgt. Rows awarded the D.S.C.

Two more tanks approached, the first three having taken up favorable positions It was apparent that the enemy was going to cover all opening with fire. One straw stack was ablaze and a number of causualties had been suffered. It was 1200 hrs. and there was no firing heard from the outskirts of the city, evidently something had gone wrong with the advance of the Combat teams and Commando Group. Rather than subject the group to annihilation, Lt. Col. Swenson surrendered the positions La it was learned that although; the combat teams had landed the landing taken place much further from the city than what had been planned.

The officers and men were lined up in the streets and disarmed. A

French officer allows an Aid Man and several other men to bring the casualties to safety before the fires in the area could reach them. The Sengalese troops tried to stip our men of their personal belongings but upon objection from our troops a French Lt. halted the practice and orde: all articles returned. Firing had ceased all over the Port and it was felt that the other troops had met the same fate or been wiped out. The enlisted men were marched to a barracks where they were held, the office: were loaded into a truck, joined by officers from around the powerhouse and taken to the Admiralty for questioning. They were asked for indentication but only the permissible information was given. During the time of imprisonment the French treated the Americans well. Some of the French officers kept the American officers abreast of the cituation and seemed fully in accord with the operations, while others showed definite that they were against the Allies. All of the American forces were released on 10 November 1942, after having been P.O.W. for 2 days.

The troops on board K.M.S. Malcolm were not subjected to quite the sa fate. On the second try at the harbor the Malcolm received several dire . hits causing several casualties among the troops, and seriously damaging the ship. The Malcolm sent a message to Capt FAN COURT that it was seriously dam god and that it was unable to make another attempt to get int the harbor as its top speed was now only four knots per hour; and was fo ced to withdraw to see. All men who were killed on the Malcolm. were buried at sea. At about 1100 hours 8 November 1942, H.M.S. Malcolm came alongside a hospital ship and all wounded were transferd from the Malcol to the hospital ship. That afternoon all troops unloaded from H.M.S. Maloolm onto L.C.V.F. a and wore landed on a white beach about twenty miles outside of Algiero. At 0400 hours 9 November, this force received orders to march to Algi rs and make contact with the rest of the battalion. The outskirts of Algiers were reached that night, and contact was made the following morning 10 November 1942. The British Navy had done a fine job of cooperation with the American forces, and the French Naval officers stated that the commander of he destroyer accomplished

a magnificent feat in going through the boom. During the entire operation of the officers and men of the American Terminal Force conducted themselves is a very commendable manner. The 3rd Battalion of the 135th Infantry Regiment was appointed as a guard of honor for divisional formal affairs as token of their outstanding services.

There were 48 casualties during the landing operations, 15 killed and 33 wounded.

The following is a personal account written by Lt. Col. E. T. SWENSON Commanding efficer of the Detachment of the 135th Infantry from 15 Oct-ober - 10 November, 1942, who was a witness during much of this phase.

QUOTE:

"The troops which were to become the American part of the Terminal Force, were assembled at Sunnylands Camp, Carrick Fergus, Ireland, about the 15th of October, 1942. At this camp they were equipped and organized for combat, predicated on the space available, for transporting them to the scene of operations. Administrative personnel and equipment were deleted to give maximum space for fighting personnel. In view of the fact that only two destroyers were available for the operations, this was thought to be the correct procedure. The has proven to be incorrect. Units cannot depend on others to furnish even the minimum of administrative equipment or supply; consequently we found ourselves entirely without facilities for supply, and feeding once the rations carried on the person were exhausted . The operations also exhausted other items of clothing and equipment. I limited the medical personnel to one officer. one non-commissioned assistant and the three aid men with each rifle unit. I also left without a chaplain. This was a serious error. medical officer with a unit, or force of this size, is inadequate. Fortunately he did not become a casualty. In view of what happened, a chal lain would have rendered invaluable service to the dying and wended, as well as officiating at burials.

I believed that some weapons of the heavy we pons company should ac-

company us, but the lack of space forced us to limit them to four heavy machine guns and two 81mm, morture, operated by reduced crews. This addition forced us to reduce rifle company strength, by the number of heavy weapons company men taken on the mission.

Communication personnel did not accompany the force. One communication officer accompanied the force end organized the communications of the force by using rifle personnel to operate communications. This was not a satisfactory solution, in spite of the outstanding effort on the part of the communications officer. Communication training is not acquired quickly.

by using two destroyers, it was necessary to split tactical units, to three rifle companies on the mission. This I velieve, was satisfactorill organized and an adequate reserve for each of two rifle companies was assured. However, a serious overcrowding of the destroyer result d, in spite of the limitations of numbers of the force. It is very possible that three destroyers would have insured better distribution of personne and givens b tter chance of getting more fightim strength landed.

I believe administrative and supply staff and equipment, that is organic in a ferce this size, should have accompanied the force on one of the other ships of the convoy, so as to be prepared for functioning after the operation was complete, or after it had progressed to a point when they could function.

During the time we were at Carrick Fergus, the troops were trained in boarding and disembarking from destroyers. One night, the operation was planned and executed, involving disembarkation from destroyers and securing part of the dock area at Belfast. The plan was based on surprise and use of darkness as cover, in a problem similar to that which would be used at Algiers. In working this operation it was found that it would be impossible to have the men carry their -"A" barracks bag. Room for them did not exist. We experimented on types of packs to accommodate the items nodes by for a soldier to carry and arrived at a satisfactory combat pack, carrying nocessary rations and equipment and

still not hampering activity. We decide on a plan of lashing the rathe large blanket rolls to the rails alongside the splinter plate on the destroyers as added protection.

On the 21st of October the destroyers "Malcolm" and "Broke" left Belfast. We sent three officers and twenty-five men with them, one officer and ten men on one, and two officers and fifteen men on the oth all heavy weapons personnel except one officer. Meavy weapons and all assuminition except normal personal loads were on the destroyer.

The afternoon of the 26th of October, the balance of the force boarde the British cruiser Sheffield, twenty-one officers and six hundred and thirteen men.

During the voyage, the plans of operation were worked out by Capt. Fencourt, R.N.; Comdr. Sears, R.N.; myself, Capt. Snellman, the three company commanders and the communications officer. Due to the fact that the ship was to put in at Gibralter for one day, it was impossable to risk disclosing the destination until after leaving Gibralter. As soon as the phip put out to sea from Gibraltar, each officer and key non-commissioned officer was given a map and a copy of the approved plan, a co-ordination and ironing out of details commenced. All who were to leaven was required to discuss, in class-room manner, in front of assembles officers and non-commissioned officers, his part in the operation. All were thoroughly familiar with the plan and alternate plans, before the time for transfer to the destroyers arrived.

Our voyage aboard the cruiser Sheffield was very satisfactory. In spite of crowded conditions, Officers and men of our force were well received and enjoyed all the hospitality possible. The men were fed very well during the voyage. Ther was considerable sea-sickness the first few days, but this disappeared entirely after that. During the duthat the ship was in Gibralter, all U.S. Army personnel stayed under cover, unless they could get naval clothing to wear, in which case they were allowed to go out on deck. As a result, the personnel of H.M.S.

RODNEY, lying alongeide, remarked about the number of survivers about the Sheffield.

On the afternoon of the 7th of November, at about 1630 hours, the destroyer "Malcolm" came alongside the Sheffield and the force detailed to go on that vessel, transferred at sea without incident. The force detailed to go on the destroyer "Broke", transferred in a like manner immediately afterwards, also without incident. The transfer at sea was completed about 1730 hours. I went with the force on the "Broke". Cay Fancourt, R.N., also went on that vessel. The destroyer was commanded Commander Layard.

How long we were with the convoy, I do not know. Darkness obscured convoy and those of us not concerned with the ship arranged to get the fed and organized on the ship, in a manner to insure most protection from small arms fire and splinters. Everyone tried to get as much rest as possible. The morale and discipline were excellent.

Shortly after aidnight I was awakened as I had eaked to be, and I was up to the bridge. Capt. Fenceurt was there and Commander Layard was is command of the bridge. The night was very dark, the sky slightly ever cast and visibility was fair. In a short the we could see the lights the harbor, but they were quite dim by distance and hase. It was still early and we cruised back and forth, working closer, trying to make our where the harbor works of Algiers were, with relation to our position

At 0220 hours, Capt. Fancount informed me that he had received a me mage, stating that the landings of combat teams had been successful an we were to go in. I informed Capt. McCulloch, the senior captain of troops aboard and who was in command of the rifle company of the vess that we were about to head into the harbor and instructed him to get all personnel possible below decks.

We steamed for approximately an hour toward the port. On nearing the port, can flankes were seen along the coast. I do not know what batteries were firing, however, they were not the port of Algiers bat-

We proceeded in the third time and received seemingly greater fire from the shore batteries, but missed the entry again and turned back to sea. When we got turned into position to try again I noticed it was getting light, Capt. Fancourt remarked about it and asked what I thought of it. I told him we would have to be satisfied to take Basin de Mustapha including the Grand Mole, inasmuch as surprise was now out of the question and daylight would soon rob us of cover to seize and occupy my we proceeded in the fourth time and the batteries began to pound. We re turned fire fr m the destroyer.

It looked like we were going to miss again and Capt. Fancourt remar about it, however, Commander Layard, seeming not to hear anything, alt

the course a little and ordered incremed speed. I was out of touch with part of our force in the vicinity of the power station and sea plane base, but they seemed to be continuing the fight. We were getting more fire and I could not get reports from the plateons that was on our left, in the direction of Brise Lames Est. I decided to take command of the group where I was and organize for defen in the area south of the warehouse on Mole Louis Billiard, where there were large piles of sand. wood and baled straw. I ordered the several NCO's to organize the outer perimeter, so that no one could get in hand granade range. I felt that as long as the artillery did not get on us, we had a fair chance. At about 1100 hours six planes of our for oame over and bombed I tto du Nord and destroyed those batteries. We know then that artillary could only come from one direction and prepare for it, feeling sure that the combat teams must be coming in having received help from the air. Shortly after this the men reported armore vehicles approaching. I gathered up the anti-tank granades and put men in favourable positions to fire. As light tanks came up they were fire

on, using the grenades; but all tries were misses! The men had not had sufficient practice in firing them. Three tanks commenced to encircle our area, and cross-fire us with 37mm and machine guns. We were able to move around and get cover. I noticed two more tanks approaching and saw the first three take positions and realized that they were going to cover all openings with fire, which would have annihilated us. One start of baled straw was affire and we had suffered a number of casualties. I found it was 12 0 hours and there was still no firing from the areas around the city. I know something had gone wrong with the advance of the combat teams and the Commando force. I know in a few minutes we should be under fire which we could not silence, nor could we hope to hold out I decided not to subject the group I was with, to more casualties and therefore surrendered the osition.

We were lined up in the street and disemmed. I had some difficulty conveying to the efficer, that we had wounded men that had to be remove before the fire got to them. A French officer allowed an aid man and several other men, to go and get them to safety. The Sengelese troops tried to strip the men of their personal belongings, rings, watches, et and I objected to the French Lieutenant, who then halted the practice and ordered all articles returned. I noticed that all firing had cease all over the port, so felt that the other groups had met the same fate as we, or had been wiped out.

We were marched to a barracks where they held the enlisted men. The officers were then loaded into a truck, where we found the officers of the other group who had the area around the power; house, and learned their story. The officers were taken to the Admiralty offices where we were asked for our indentification. Several tried to question us, but got only the information that training has told us to reveal.

Several officers were not accounted for and a number of enlisted men as well. We did not account for them until we were released on Tuesday afternoon. I visited the hospital first and saw all the wounded and the went in search our division headquarters.

During the time we were prisoners, we were well treated by the Frenc. Some officers kept us abreast of the situation and seemed to be fully i. accord with the opperation; others showed that they were definitely against us.

During the entire operation, the men of this command conducted themselves in a very commendable manner. There were outstanding examples o courage and ability. Separate reports will cover acts by individuals, which will merit at least, commendations.

I do not know anything of seamanship. I do know the personnel of the British navy did a fine job of cooperation with us. I was told by French naval officers, that whoever commanded the destroyer which went through the boom accomplished a feat that was magnificent in naval operations. From observation I know Commander Layard was remarkably cool

I believe that, could we have gone through the boom on the first try we would have got both destroyers into the harbor. We should have had the advantage of surprise and cover of darkness to seize and consolidat our objectives. If the attacks on the flanks had come in on schedule, or the timeing could have been determined to get troops into the suter edges of the city shortly after daylight, the operation would have been very successful with two destroyers getting into the ort.

Whether a complete tactical unit should be used on aperation like the difficult to say; one must contemplate loss of vessels by gunfire.

Task forces of this nature should receive special training.

Air photos received were six days old at the time of entry into por I believe they should be not more than twenty-four hours old. The shipping in this port was completely rearranged from the day the last air photo was taken.

It was our mission to secure the port and prevent sabotage of the pand port facilities. It was good fortune to the allied cause, that the French decided not to sabotage the port or installations and not the operation of the Terminal Force. We failed in our mission and at most merely caused a diversion."

PHASE III 135TH INFANTRY REGIMENT (Cont'd)

The 3rd Battalion remained in the city of Algiers from 8 November 1942 until the 2nd January 1943 when they were relieved by the 2nd Battalion 133rd Infantry Regiment. During their stay in Algiers the duties of the Battalion was mainly garrisoning and police duty within the city. On 2 January 1943 the Battalion left Algiers via train eroute for Tlemos Algeria.

REMAINDER OF REGIMENT MOVES TO ORAN:

On 8 November 1942, Companies E.G., and H plus the remainer of Co M, with attached communications and medical sections, was detached from the 135th Infantry Regiment to form part of divisional advance party which left Camp Blessingbourne 8 December. The group traveled by motor to Fintons, North Ireland and there entrained for Belfast where ships were boarded to take them to Liverpool. At Liverpool other ships were boarded to take them to Liverpool. Africa. After an uneventful voyage, the party landed at Oran on 21 December and assembled in an area 18 mile from Oran. On 30 December the men proceeded by motor, to Religane, Algeria where the force underwent training until 5 January 1943 when the entrained for Tlemcen, Algeria.

Meanwhile the remainder of the regiment had left Fintons, North Ireland and on 23 December set sail from Liverpool - destination - Africa This unit landed at Mere-el-Kebir, Algeria on 3rd January 1943. By Il January the regiment was together again in the vicinity of Negier where training was immediately begun.

PICHON - FIRST ACTION AGAINST THE GERMANS:

on 2 February, 1943, the 135th Combat Team with the 109th Quartermas Battalion attached, started it's move east for Tunisia, North Africa. 0. 4 February Col C.M. Parkin and Lt Col Carley L. Marshall were relieved of assignment to the regiment and col Robert W. Ward assumed command. After successive bivouecs at Sidi-Bel-Abbes, Orleansville, L'Arba, Bi-bou-Arreridi, Guelma and Le Mef, the regiment moved into an assembly area 10 miles east of Maktar, Tunisia the night of 8-9 February.

The 135th Regimental Combat Team was attached to the 1st United

PHASE III 135TH INFANTRY REGIMENT (Cont'd)

States Infantry Division and received orders to relieve elements of the French Army in the Pichon area. Their Mission was to defend the sector against enemy attack, preventing the progress of the enemy moving in any westerly direction with 3 Battalions abreast. The reliefs took place on successive nights in the following order: The first Battalion 135th Infantry relieving the 3rd Battalion of the 1st RTA and the south half of the 2nd battalion, 1st RTA on the 10th-11th of February; the 3rd battalion, 135th Infantry, relieving the lat battalion of the lat RTA on the 11th-12th of February; and the 2nd battalion, 135th Infantry. relieving the notth half of the 2nd battalion 9th RTA, and the 1st hattalion 9th RTA, on the 12th-13th of February. The 125th Field Artiller Battalion relieved 3 batteries of French Artillery (2 batteries 75mm gu 1 battery 65mm howitzer) on the 13th-14Th of February and the 135th Regimental Combat Team, as a team, was in position against the enemy fo: the first time in World War II. All remaining French artillery and ant: tank protection, the British Royal Artillery anti-aircraft and anti-tan units remained in position to support. When the reliefs had been completed, Col. Ward assumed the responsibility for the sector which was protected on the left flank by French Irregulars and elements of the 1s U.S. Infantry Division; the right flank was exposed to enemy attack fro both the Fondouk Gap and Rhorab. All the field artillery was formed in groupments of five 25 pounder batteries and furnished direct support to the 135th Combat Team. At midnight the 14th of February the Regiment came under control of the 34th Infantry Division in combat, for the fir time in World War II.

The Regiment suffered its first casualties in this sector. Pfc. John J. Dresser, Company "B", was wounded while one patrol on the 14th of February. On the 15th of February, a five man patrol from Company "B" failed to return. Early that evening during an air attack, Captain Charles A. Fanning and 2nd Lt. Charles B. Keys, both of Co. "C" were wounded, and Pfc. Erwin L. Nichols, Company "C" and Technician Fifth Brade Herbert K. Schneider, Band, was killed by bomb fragments. Staff

Sargeant Swanson and Pvt. Robert Carlson were wounded by the same bomb fragment. It ws during this time that the Regiment was issued British Compo Rations in Lieu of our own type rations.

On the 14th of February the 16 th Infantry reported an enemy attack on a large scale in their sector in he vicinity of Faid Pass and Sidibou-Zid. The attack, by infantry with tank support was preceded by a bombardment by "Stuka" dive bombers. By the next day the situation was grave and the 135th, in a warning order from the Division Commander, Gen. Ryder, was told to be prepared for anything from an attack to a withdrawal. By the 16th the enemy had forced a breakthrough at Faid Pa and 50 to 60 tanks were reported to be avoing northwest from Sudaquia at 1400 hours.

The order was received for the 135th to withdraw at 1900 hours, the of February. At 1730 hours the enemy attacked the 135th with a small b fierce and determined infantry attack sumported by mortar and artillery fire. This attack was beaten off however and the orderly withdrawal be gen on schedule. A force made up of three rifle platoons one each from Co's "B", "G" and "I", plus supporting light machine guns from each battalion was left to cover the withdrawal under Com'd of Major Ernest E. Hall. Battery B of the 125th Field Artillery Battalion was to support the covering force in their mission which they did very effectivel The Regimental S-4 Captain Anderson, left 6 trucks at the southern truc rendezvous to transport this force. The 1st Battalion executive of ice #111 command the covering forces and the covering force withdrew upon his order at the proper time. This force constituted the Division Rear Guard. The withdrawal covered a distance of some 30 miles. The night was clear and warm and the terrain covered in the withdrawal varied fro mountainous to rolling country on and off roads. As transportation was not available, much of the move was done on foot carrying all equipment What ammunition, there, was that couldn't be carried by hand was effectively booby trapped with grenades. The 2nd and 3rd Battalions move to the vicinity of Er Rbeiba that night and on to Sbiba the next day where they took up defensive positions. The lat Battalion was reverted

PHASE III 1135TH INFANTRY REGIMENT (Cont'd)

to Division reserve and moved directly to the vicinity of Sbiba that a ght, by way of Maktar. The order of withdrawal was as follows:- Artillery, lst platoon, Battery "B" 106th CA (AA), 2nd Battalion, Headquarte and Headquarters Co., 3rd Battalion, Anti-tank Co., "Q" Battery, 93rd Anti-tank Battalion, and lst Battalion. As for the Anti-tank guns in Regiment, all guns in the areas of the 2nd and 3rd Battalions withdraw with the Battalion in whose sector they were located. All Anti-tank guns in the lst Battalion sector, except the lst Battalion organic 37mm Antitank guns, will withdraw with the Anti-tank Co.

Also on the rear guard task force were the three Battalions, anti-tallions and the Anti-tank Company. It was at this time that the lat Battalion front extended three miles.

The 2nd and 3rd Battalions withdrew to the vicinity of Er Reiba, an to Sbiba the next day where these two units were to take up defense positions. Transportation was not available and the Regiment moved on for a distance of 30 miles, closing in on the new area at 2300 hours, the of February.

Althought the troops were new in combat, the difficulties encounter in a withdrawal on such a large scale under harassing enemy fire, were overcome and the withdrawal was orderly and successful with few casual suffered. Upon reaching their respective areas that hight and early t following morning vigilance was kept constantly.

THE DEFENSE OF SBIBA VALLEY

The 2nd Battalion was in position on the Divisions right flank, the 3rd Battalion, the left flank with one platoon occupying Hill 746 and maintaining liason with the 1st Division on the extreme left. The 1st Battalion withdrew and was reverted to Division reserve with the route of march via Maktar-Rohia-Sbiba. It then sent a Liaison officer to Division.

The 2nd and 3rd Battalions were in position when, by noon of the 19 of February, enemy tanks which had broken through at SEBITLA launched an attack on a BRITISH GUARDS Brigade on the Division's RIGHT flank.

PHASE III 135TH INVANTEY REGISENT (Cont.d)

These tank attacks followed by infantry continued for four days. While the brunt of the attacks were borne by the 133rd Infantry Combat Team holding the right half of the division scotor, smaller attacks were best off by the 135th and the defense held. Most of the enemy units were hel off by long range artillery before they reached the main line of resisti ce and those groups wheich managed to infilt rate the positions were either killed or captured. Their attacks were diversionary efforts to (tain our forces in the SBIBA valley so that reinforcements could not be sent to the vicinity of the KASSERINE PASS where the main drive of the enemy. begun the morning of the 20th of February, had broken through the pass and successfully advanced toward TEBESSA and THALA. The situation at THALA became so serious that on the night of the 22nd-23rd of February the Regiment again withdrew, upon orders, to the vicinity of ROHI. so as to conform with the lines in the THALA sector. In this withdrawe: the 1st Battalion reverted back to Regimental control while the 2nd Bat. talion went into Division reserve. A new defense was built up by the li Battalion on the right Regimental center, and the 3rd Battalion on the left Regimental center, complete with minefields and tactical wire at a positions with well coordinated and situated fire power covering all ap roaches.

Each individual provided himself with an individual trench, minimum depth 4 ft, maximum length 4 ft., maximum width-shoulder width. Individual trenches constructed to these dimensions provided protection against tank and dive-bomber attack.

All Arabs passing through the lines in either direction were shot an left on the spot. Arabs acting in a suspicious way in the rear areas we be treated in the same manner. Arabs found in the rear areas, but not soting suspiciously, were taken into custody and held for, from 24 to 3 hours with no food, shelter, or water, and then released. These positions were ordered held at allocate by Col. Wird, Commanding the 135t Infantry Regiment.

The main enemy drive, consisting mostly of Panzer units, was halted

Armored elements and Artillery units, and information from various sources indicated a general enemy withdrawal from all sectors on this from on 2.th of February. A Combat Patrol of 50 men from Co "C" brought a wealth of needed information concerning the enemy.

on the 25th, the 2nd Battalion plus other divisional troops was formed into a unit known as the "WULF FORCE" which was to be a reconnaissance in force. "WULF FORCE" was divided into two groups, the first under the command of Lt. Col. Clarence J. LEE went SOUTH through SBIBA and on to SBEITLA. The second group under the command of Capt. Frank A. Mc Cullot went toward KEF el AHMAR PASS. From the information gained by "WULF FORCE" the division was able to move forward on the night of the 26th of February to its' original line near SBIBA where a new defensive position was taken up, mine fields laid, and all positions wired. While this was being done, the defense in the vicinty of ROHIA was improved to serve as a secondary position. The 135th Infantry Command Post was in the vicin: south of BAR-CHAOUGH AMARA.

THE ELALA - PICHON DIVERSION

Orders were received on the 4th of March to proceed to the vicingity of PICHON by way of ELALA with the mission of diverting any reinforcements from the northern sectors by a show of force. The following units under Col. Wards command were selected to carry out the operation; the 3rd Battalion, 135th Infantry; 125th Field Artillery Battalion with one platoon 107th C.A. (Anti-aircraft) attached; one company 751st Tank Battalion; one platoon, 813th Tank Destroyer Battalion; and 34th Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop with four pioneer and demolition squads, 109th Engineers attached.

This force advanced to the vicinity of ER RBEIBA by 0400 hours, the 5th of March and continued the advance at 0430 hours. The Regiment maintained 24 hour outposts in the vicinity of ER RBEIBA to give warning of any enemy approaching from the East. The outpost was composed of 1 off ficer and 2 rifle squads with radio communication with day and night patrols to the East. This position was occupied on the night of the

PHASE III 135TH INFANTHY REGISSRIT (Cont.)

9th-10th of March, 1943. They had rations and water for 2 days, and al their reports sent to Regiment were relayed ismediately to Vivision. A 1150 hours contact with the enemy was gained by patrols operating in as west of EL ALA. The enemy units were driven off with small arms fire and the advance continued. Companies I, and K along with elements of the 34th Cavalry Recognissance Troop advanced seat from EL ALA astride the secondary EAST-WEST ELALA-PICHON road and by 1530 hours had taken t their objectives and were under heavy rifle, machine fun and mortar fir By 1460 hours the 125th Field Artillery who were in position received direct fire from enemy armored vehicles. The 125th Field Artillery fir their field pieces as direct fire weapons and drove the enemy tanks awa

At 1600 hours information was received that enemy motori ed infentry was observed detricking near the LFFT rear of the force and that enemy armor was with them. Other armor was also re orted to be advancing north from HMDJEB EL ALEUN coming toward the right rear of the force. Because of the size of the enemy forces converging to the rear and too. the advantage they had in position, orders were handed down to withdraw to the original lines. The withdrawal orders directed the tank company and the tank destroyer platoon to take up positions in the rear to meet eny enemy threats. The Recommeiseance troop was dispersed along the river five kilometers WEST and two kilometers north of EL ALA; four pla toons of the 135th remained in position and the whole covering force we supported by Battery B of the 125th Field Artillary Battalion. The night was very dark and the roads were "ice slick" with sud from the re which was now falling. In the darkness, some of the leading elements took a wrong road and in order to got back on the route of withdrawal : was necessary for them to infiltrate enemy lines which they did without mishap.

All units closed in on the area near ER REEIBA by dawn and proceeded WEST to the original positions where the Division made prepartions for attack on FONDOUK.

The following comments on the forementioned offensive are herewith submitted as being the statements of Major, then Captain, Roland Ander

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PHASE III 135TH INFANCRY REGIDERAT (CORT'D)
Regimental S-4 of the 135th Infantry Regiment.

- 1. The "C" Ration, which every man is authorized to carry on his person, was consumed before he left on this Mission. As a consequence a number of men were without food for 36 hours.
- 2. (A) Motor Convoys traveled too close together during daylight hours. The Battalion Organic transportation was the biggest offender.
- (B) In many instances equipment was on vehicles which was not authorized, thus vehicles were not hauling the prescribed loads of Ammunition. Water and Gas Cans were mixed on vehicles.
- (C) Battalion Transportation Officers did not supervise Convoys at dangerous places, or leave guides.
 - (D) Vehicles were cutting into Convoys too much.
- 3. The proneer and Amminition Officers were not reconnoiteri: routes to move amminition forward, by Wehicle of by carrying particle additional ammunition would have been required on recent Offens. it would have taken at a minimum of three hours to supply the units
