The last week in August the Regiment moved to the vicinity of SLIS-EN near SIDI Bal. AB43, by truck. Here the troops were put through the tough training at the Fifth Army Leadership and Eattle Training denter.

In the middle of July, all Company Commanders had been sent to this Battle School to prepare for the conditioning of the proper when they arrive. Here began the tough program of obstacle courses, live artillery barrages and problems with ball assumition. The mon were also given training in the operation, capabilities and tactical use of the enemy's weapons. Might problems were conducted regularly. Infiltration, attack, scouting and patroling were studied and many problems involved units as large as a Battalion in these operations. At the conclusion of this training the Regiment returned to an assembly area between BOU SYER and AIN XL TURGE.
