Weded across the rain-swellen Voltumes River in the face of withering fire from German riflemen and machine gumers dug in along the northern bank. Although water-scaked and chilled to the bone, our troops fought their say through enemy mechine-gun pits and fox holes to establish a fire beachhead. This crossing of the Voltumes opened the second phase of the Alied campaign in Italy. Five weeks earlier, the 34th Division had landed on the hostile beaches of the bull of SALERNO, Mow it was attacking a well defended river line.

MOVING TO THE VOLTURNO

during this phase, but first, for a brief feview-After the 133rd Infantry had taken belief on the 3rd of October, the 135th Regiment had been ordered to assemble along with the rest of the division in the vicinity of MONTALARCH O, 18 miles to the East of CASCERTA. Although the murch to this new area involved no fighting with the enemy, combating the weather and the rough mountainous roads was a battle in itself.

Beginning with a terrific thursderstorm which struck the area on the evening of the 28th of portember, raise followed day after day. The curse of rais and mad dogged the footsteps of our troops all the way to the VOLTUMO. hen the 30th Infantry was relieved it proved quite a problem on the 8th of October. Any shifting of troops until after dark was impossible, as derman Artillery fired on anything that stirred in the valley. How bridges, and maddy reads further complicated the task of getting sen and equipment into the area. There were a lot of ignal equipment and transportation, with the exception of a few jeeps, that were bogged down in the thick mire. The tasks of clearing out the enemy, patroling the river banks for crossing points, and trying to keep dry and warm in the rainy weather were impossible. All these climatic conditions plus the fact that the 10 Corps meeded additional time also, to get set, postponed the river crossing from the might of the 9th-10th to 12th-13th October, giving the regiment additional Cont.

time to complete the assembling of its troops, reconnoiter the river line, and work out the details of its plan of abtack.

Along the VOLUMEN the enemy had entremented himself in the first good defensive positions worth of HAPLES, making the river the first large scale obstacle. At SALEENO, they had fought for each foot of each and counterattacked repeatedly, but after our beachhard was secure, they had carried out an orderly withdrawal.

on the North side of the Volturio, Kristianis troops were analting the impending battle. During the days while the 135th Infantry Regiment and the other units of the 5th Aray were moving up to the river and completing preparations for the attack, the enemy had been hard at work laying mines, digging cum pits, and organizing a system of machine-gun emplacements to cover the river banks with interlocking bands of fire. Analy artillery was served in on the most likely sites for the construction of bridges; and mobile units, held been from the river line were prepared to mave to any threstened sector. Then finally, before our men could reach the enemy defenses, they must, first, battle their way across the smilt waters of the VOLTHAM and up the steep muddy bank on the far side. Their only advantage lay in their numerical superiority: Their hope of quick successe lay in surprise. The enemy did not know at what time or at what point the blow would come.

In the 31th division sector, which was nearly 13 bilometers wide, the stream was swift and in some places deep enough to cover a man's head, with steep banks overgrown with shrubbery to the water's edge. Immediately upon taking ever the sector, very active petrolling was begun, in order to discover the best places to cross, the easiest bridge sites and, especially, the location of enemy defenses. Futrals of a few men crossed the stream repeatedly to feel out the Jerman positions: careful study was made of serial photographs, and intelligence officers, by noting direction of Jerman tracer fire, were able to draw a quite com late and accurate picture of the Jerman fire plan. This this was going on, supplies of bridging equipment, artillery amountation, and fuel were brought up on convoy after convoy. Surprise, if we could achieve it would be decisive!

Therefore all traffic meer the river had to be squeezed into the hours of darkness and so large were the movements that only superb traffic control prevented jams, that adght well have given amor our whole plan. The direction and density of the truffic was se well sorked-out, and so faulthously coordinated, that this operation is even today constantly cite! as a model of good practice. On the evening of the 12th of October, like a tightly coiled string, the teginent was ready to snap into action.

However, before the "jump-off" let us see how the spring had become so tightly coiled in respect to this Resissant, the 135th Infantry.

by the 18th of October, the Regiment had completed the relief of the 30th Infantry troops in its sector of the front, and, as said before, was working out the details of its plan of attack. Ahead lay a jumbled mass of low hills resembling a clanched fist threat out toward the high mountains to the southeast. At the foot of this hill mass. the volume alver flore in an irregular half circle like a most protecting a mediaval: fortress. All seventeess of observation lay with the enemy. He would have to be driven beatback from the forward line of hills, before it would be possible for the 135th Infantry to but in bridges or even to make use of the roads leading to the bridge sites. In the 3 days of reconnectering, foot troops of the 135th Infantry on the right Clark of the division found points to ford the rivers in most places the steep middy banks and the sandy bottoms made use of vehicles impractical, though at one suct near an old dam, it appeared that waterproofed vehicles could cross. Col. cobert # Wards Commanding Officer of the deligent, ordered the first battalion and "3" Company to lead the asnault to their objective, the high ground behind the village of 3 UILLS. Then this objective was taken, the second Battalion was to pass through and continue the advance. To accist the men in keeping to ether in the darkness, all troops were directed to wear a strip of white tape down the center of their pucks.

on the evening of the 12th of October as darkness sottled over the VOLTURNO. a full moon rose, lighting up the sharp peak of MOUNT TIFATA and spreading an cerie glow over Cont'd.

the open fields of the valley. For once, there was to be no rain. The enemy had no reason to suspect that a major battle was impending. Our customary night patrols worked their say some to the river, drawing an occasional burst of machine gun fire from the enemy bank or causing a ner ous ierman outpost to shoot off a colored signal flare. This had been going on for days, and signified nothing out of the ordinary to the enemy troops in their for-holes and gun emplacements. Lack in our rear bivough areas, it was a different story. Here was all the bustle and ordered confusion which accompany the movement of troops. Tank drivers attached to the degiment, warmed up their motors, engineers nearby leaded rubber pontoons into trusks, our artillesy men studied their five plane, and long lines of lifth infaitrymen marched out of their forward assembly areas. thunder of the rillery firing all along the VOLTURNA-CALORE River line on enaported energy our positions, who fields, and targets of opportunity, and at 0800 hours, just as thousands of other gran-faced men were doing, at so man, other paints along the VOLTURNA, Infantrymen of the 135th alloped and alid down the steep river banks and waded out into the cold, swift water. The energy made no serious effort to oppose the crossing; once past the river, the troops moved forward rapidly. At 0220 hours Company "A" crossed just below the junction of the VOLTURNO and CALORE Rivers, was already advancing over the plowed fields lyin; at the foot of the hilks, and Company "2" c osaing at the other end of the segmental front, was sending back prisoners at 0250 hours.

the first terms was personally captured by first it. vos ... imble, commanding officer of company "al", she personally directed the security of the bridge-head so that the balance of the company which cross.

There was intense machine-gun fire but Lt. imble's personal direction and inspiration of each platoen, spurred the mission to success. His leadership making possible the crossing of the Battalion brought the award of the Distinguished Service Cross.

nother coopers who lost the life. It, Marris was the platoon leader of the leading element and although the barrage of friendly artillery fire had not lifted he plusted across the river at the head of his men, in the face of enemy artillery, marter and machine-gun fire and gained the other side. It, Harris was mortally wounded by shrapnel and while suffering great pain he directed his plutoon in organizing the ground and shot flares in the air to mark his position. Then it, Kimble came to him, the dying Lieutement pointed out several enemy machine-gun positions. He was also awarded the Distinguished pervice Cross.

Another and Lieutenant, filliam D. Sporbert, of Company 'A', lead his platoon in placing a guide rope across the smift flowing, toescherous river, enabling the balance of the naturalism to cross. After reaching the far side Lt. Sporbert ran into a mine and was thrown into the river. Rescued and given first aid, he set out to join his Flatoon, but enroute, he entered audicafield, to aid a wounded man. In doing so, he was seriously injured by a consussion mine. The Distinguished service Gross was awarded to Lt. Sporbert.

It would be impossible at this time to cite all acts of heroism and the immunerable acts of bravery displayed by men of the 135th Infantry during this rugged phase of their gallant record, however, it can be noted that the bravery shown while crossing the VOLTURUO, is tyrical of the american fighting soldier that has gained him world-wide respect.

The balance of the first mattalion crossed the river, and cater neutralizing enemy positions, that had been by-passed worth of ScULLA, the Battalion was reorganized and prepared to go to the next objective. Itill encountering not too much opposition, the first lattalion pushed on toward the second phase line. Shortly after dam, the engineers had a ferry in operation, making it cossible to get light. vehicles across the river.

In the early morning hours, it appeared that the enemy would not attempt to make a determined stand. Then as the norming fore on, enemy mines and fire began to slow down the savence of the 135th infantry. The first Battalion reported at 0930 hours that tank in AOW I was firing on the ferry, and a fer minutes later tanks in the case vicinity were firing on the battalion dominand fost. At 1320 hours a counterattack was reported forming up in front of this Dattalion. The Avision Artillery fired concentrations into the suspected area, however, and the attack did not materialize. Hindered be enemy minefields and continually under fire, the first Esttalion made little progress during the afternoon. The ascond Bettalion moving up after dark, had to fight its way thru a pocket of formans which had been by-passed during the morning advance. The day closed with the 135th Infantry still short of the second phase line.

In regards at this time to Carmon Company, lat Lieutenant Faul . Blossen, became sick on the 12th and was evacuated to the hospital leaving 2nd ut. Dean C. Fellows assigned command of the Company.

Continuing that attack early the next morning, the first Battalion occupied Hill 283, its objective, at 0500 hours. Shortly after daybreak, 4 tank destroyers from the 776th lank destroyer estation managed to ford the river. Placed in hull-down positions on ill 2.3, the ank estroyers were used to support the advance of the Infantry. There were several threatened counter-attacks on the position of the assault attalions, Jont'd....

but one of serious proportions developed. By the end of the morning the area South of the second phase line had been cleared, and the deglment had patrols operating in all directions.

summittion to the Borth bank of the VOLTUANO and to bring back sounded. A few vehicles were able to ford the river and incincers rushed to desine roads and build by-passes on the Borth bank. At 1000 hours, the bridge was opened in the vicinity of DULGHTA and B hours later, the 3rd Battalion of the 135th Infantry was ordered to move to the Borth side of the river. All during this phase the Engineers worked with fervor, repairing, building and supporting the assault troops. At 2300 hours, the road from the first bridge site from the vicinity of DULGHTA was opened and additional vehicles began to cross the river.

patrols from "C" Company made contact with elements of the 168th Infantry. Other patrols reached highway 07 to the north and crossed the upper reach of the VOLTURNO to make contact with the elements of the 15th Mivision on the right flank. All indications pointed to a general enemy with drawal. The major struggle on the degimental front, as on the Mivisional front, proved to be a fight for supplies. It was essential that before the troops could go further, the Engineers bridge the river so that supplies and supporting weapons could be brought up.

The second Sattalion moved up to the low ridge south of MUVIANO and sent patrols into the outskirts of the village sithout contact of the enemy on the night of the lith of "ctober but on the 15th, combat patrols on the north side manualth stiff resistance. In a typical delaying action, the enemy attempted to halt the advance of fifte platopne by posting 2 light machine guns on either side of a trail, such as are so common in couthern Italy, and stationing men farther in the rear to lob granades at our troops. Committe, denoral Clark, 5th Army Commander had received information that the enemy see withdrawing before VI Corps, and ordered all ivisions to continue on that missions mithout delay. General Hyder, then, directed the 135th infantry to resume its advance. On the morning of the 15th of October, General Jaffey, 34th Infantry Mivision Emperative Officer, same to the Regimental outpost above RUVIANO and plans were made for the clearing of the team and taking the high ground Northest of TUVIANO. Throughout the day, our troops met stiff resistance in the rolling grain fields: venovaris, and olive groves north of the village. In the meentime, the Anti-tank mine platoon and the ingineers had worked up along the road in the last side of the VULTUGIO to the Sast of AUVIANO and jeep trails wore broken forward from nore, yest the blown bridge by-pasies, to get assumition and dater in under cover of darkness. of its presence. Juring the night of the 15th, the enemy sitheres, and the legiment swept on up the valley for the next 2 days.

by morning of the 17th of Votober the 3rd hattalion had contacted patrols of the 168th infantry on the left in the vicinity of ALVIDNAMO. The second Battalion on Hill 276 (North Morthwest 3 miles from MUVIAMO) immediately started patrolling to determine the likely spots for the second crossing of the VOLTURMO.

The 1st Battalion moved thru and occupied the second Battalion's positions during the day and had been heavily engaged by enemy fire from the crossroads East of JAN FER JERANIX, which was last of DRAJONI about 2 miles. Two Jerman companies were estimated to be in position there and the first Battalion requests for artillery fire finally neutralized the position. The Battalions were directed to clear the enemy from the river line between area of Hill 127 up the river 5 miles to the SAS FERDINANDO sector on the mornin, of the 16th. The 2nd Battalion took over the reserve position of the lat Battalion, meanwhile.

then the morning of the 18th arrived, the Battalians had reached a line, Hill 20th seat of ALVIIIIANS to the VOLTUREO. The tired Infantiymen were more than half-way to their first objective. Some 2 miles should of them, at the base of the hill-mass on their left, was SHAJUNI; to their right scross the valley was the forbidding MATESE Mountains.

The enemy during this phase consisted of the 3rd Pansar brenadier Edviaton, a unitarish included in its ranks, many seasoned troops from the dusaten front. In those days the Jermans had smple equipment of excellent quality including a number of Mark IV tanks; however, such had been the pressure that our tecops had put upon them, that prisoners confessed that their ranks were seriously depleted and their troops short of food and sleep due to the remorseless howevering of our artillery which continued by day and night. ALVI MANO was occupied without resistance and the village of MANONI taken by assault, the 1-th of October by our teamsate, the 168th intentry.

into our sector and pushed across the river taking a sosition near the blown bridge, it was first schered that we were to se ure a bridgehead with one Sattalian, backing it up with unother sattalian, but this was cancelled when enemy tanks and armored vehicles were seen caseing, possibly for a counter-attack in DAADWI.

me to the thorough efforts of continued patrolling a good crossing was located with a hard bottom where vehicles could cross, and on the morning of the 19th of October, the 3rd and 1st Dattalions secured a bridgehead with the 1st Eattalion going into position on the left of the road running to ALIFE, and the third on the right followed by the second attalion.

the morning was foggy and rain and it did not clear up until later in the morning by which time the lst Dattalion had by-passed many of the enemy unobserved. Deveral of the prisoners from the enemy artillery units were taken by this time. Heavy fire from 7.6% shells and "nebelwerfers" were encountered, and this caused a slight disorganization in the Battalion. Back at the Fiord, almost all the legimental vehicles were conteil down because of the rising sater (due to the continual rains). It was at this time that Col. menson, regimental Executive Officer, personally winded into the creek and co-ordinated the offorts of the Engineers and the Battalion (1st) P & A teams to repair the flord. The surrounding terrain was low and swampy, cut with deep, swift canals perpendicular to the route of advance. The second Battalion was lead by "I" Company at 0230 hours and met no opposition as they dipped down the low banks and waded acros; the icy water to the plain on the other side. The legimental Command Fost was set up a mile north on a straight road leading to ALIFE. The attached dompany of the 776th Pank Wastrojer Battalion was confined to the wad, and by daylight had by-passed several blown bridges and acrived at a crossroad 1 kilometer south-east of ALIFS. The termin of ored the bijest obstacle to the advance of the foot-troops.

During the day, patrols from the most indvance elements of the second Hattalion, went into the old walled town of ALIFE and found it full of mines and booby-traps.

The oridus icross the swift mountain stream was demplished. The streets were filled

with rubble, for the town had been hit with good results by B-25's of the Taotical Bomber Air Force on two night of the 12th and 13th of Jotober. The 135th Infantry was across the river and it advenced toward ALIF. The Intambry was delayed during the morning as it orosed the valley for it, too, was cut by deep and swift canals. Demolition of bridges slowed the progress of the 776th Tank Destroyer Battalion which moved along the poplar-limed road to support the attack. The 3rd battalion hampered only by sporadic artillery fire and occasional minefields, embered bom-blasted ALIFE before daylight on the 20th of votober, hen the fog lifted unexpectedly during the middle of the morning, the list liabtalion was caught in the open flats southwest of town. The enemy in the hills above, issediately poured rifle and machine gun fire on the men and kept them pinned down until dark and the pattalion received considerable artillery fire, and also encountered for the first time fire from the Jerman rocket gun, the Min Langet, on the flat land outh of the toen. The 2nd Battalion established road blocks near ALIPE on the 20th of October is remained in reserve north of that town until the 28th of October. Fetrole were sent out to contact the 7th Infantry, 3rd Division on the left flank. The 2nd Battalion, also, was emposed to artillery fire when the fog lifted, apparently drawn by the lask bestroyers guns in the vicinity of the Cross Read about la miles South-east of allfi. The mission of the jrd Battalion was to go around the right of ALIFE, and protest the right flank of the Regiment. The let Battalion was to skirt the left south edge of town. The 2nd Bettalion took up positions to protest the right flank of the Regiment.

Progress was made at a slow but steady pace and at noon, the 21st of Votober, 11st onem, tanks were reported to have slipped in on our left flank on the north aids of the river. The 125th Field artillery, attached to the neglmental 135th Combat Team for support, did some excellent smooting and the Cub Ubservation filet reported five tanks out of action with direct hits on two. During the night, the Germans were able to work in the arga and salvage them, Heavy shalling came in all day over the entire area. At 0530 hours, Divisional artillery began firing successive concentrations that progressed at the rate of 100 yards every & minutes. Lifth Field artillery Battalion slows expended 838 rounds in the next 2 hours. Reanchile, men supplied by the 100th Battalion to guide the 2nd Battalion, 135th Infantry to the line of departure became lost in the derkness and fog of the early-morning. At 0530 hours the Battalion was several 100 yards to the rear of the line. Then the second Battalion finally jumped off at 0605 hours it left from positions several hundred yards too far north.
