
### 34th Infantry Division Assn 2008 Reunion - A Grand Success - Des Moines



### SECTION III NEWSLETTER - October

As the cold and wet weather increased the needs of the troops, the task of supplying them became more and more difficult. The front lines were generally several hours away from the dumps, so that carrying an emergency load often required the time and labor of large units of combat troops.

The road net itself was not only limited but had the further disadvantage of being intersected by the Volturno River, a stream capable of sudden fury. High water from 15 to 18 November washed out the temporary bridges which our engineers had thrown across the upper river, and a flash-flood again closed the upper bridges from 5 to 7 December. Rain, traffic, and the enemy combined to keep the road system in a condition that required constant work. On the Il Corps front, road and bridge maintenance was the principal task of the 111th Engineer Battalion, for whom "Mignano mud" made life a nightmare. Heavy traffic moving over the roads turned them into streams of mud, full of seemingly bottomless pits. Ton after ton of gravel and rock was spread in the worst places. Enemy artillery not only harassed the men at work but blew craters that had to be filled.

A very large part of VI Corps traffic had to pass Venafro. Every twenty-four hours in December, four thousand vehicles were moving through this bottleneck; as a result convoys had to be controlled strictly to keep unnecessary motor movement down to a minimum. To lighten the load on Highway No. 85 and the narrow road to Pozzilli, the 120th Engineers constructed two additional roads from Venafro to Pozzilli and followed close behind the combat troops to repair the Sant' Elia road. Eventually, however, the engineer roads came to the steep mountains where mules and men with pack-boards had to take over on the narrow, twisting trails which were the only supply and evacuation routes for most of the infantry.

Without mules our winter campaign in Italy would have been impossible. On the flats, motor vehicles could churn through the mud; on the worst slopes, only men, climbing upward a few inches at a time with a case of rations or a can of water on their packboards, could make the ascent. Between these two extremes were miles of trails where the mule became an exasperating necessity. At the beginning of November the 45th Division had thirty-two animals; at the end of December the number exceeded four hundred with an additional 140 in a section of an Italian pack troop. Still more mules were needed, for 250 animals were required to supply the basic needs of an infantry regiment in the line.

Mules were a novelty for many American soldiers, and at first everything had to be improvised, including the mule skinners. Each division had a provisional pack troop with personnel drawn principally, but not exclusively, from the service companies. The 3d Division had brought mules from Sicily, but all other units had to find their animals in Italy by purchase in rear areas or by requisition from the farmers. At the outset the shortage of pack animals was so great that those on hand were quickly worked to death or worn out. Not only were mules scarce, but there was also a lack of halters, shoes, nails, and packsaddles. Italian packsaddles were issued wherever possible, since those from the United States proved to be too large for the average-sized Italian mule and reduced the load he could carry, which normally totaled about 220 pounds. By the end of December Fifth Army had brought in a French veterinary hospital which helped conserve the scanty mule stock, and the arrival of regular French and Italian pack units from Africa and Sardinia relieved many infantrymen from supply duties.

### So, what did you think about the rations?

This article is reprinted from "Lessons Learned in Combat, Nov 1942 - Sept 1944", HQ 34th Infantry Division,  $5^{th}$  U.S. Army.

The 'C' or 'K' type ration was an emergency ration and is not meant to feed troops over long periods of time. During January and February 1944 the 3rd Battalion, 135th Infantry established an improvised field bakery in the kitchen bivouac area and made doughnuts, fruit turnovers, cakes and cookies, and in addition made sandwiches of jellies and jams and fresh meat when it was obtainable, and made spreads for sandwiches from canned meat. These were packed into ration boxes, ammunition boxes and sent up to the troops by pack mule. It greatly reduced the monotony of the ration, adding the necessary calories in the diet which was deficient in the 'C' or 'K'ration. Being more palatable the troops ate more of it and their morale and physical condition were much better than that of troops which were fed a steady diet of emergency rations.

### S/Sgt. JOHN DIAVASTES, 133rd Infantry:

"While troops are on the line, kitchens ought to be able to draw materials to make pastry such as doughnuts, fruit turnovers, cakes and cookies, etc., to y be things enclosed you won't eat so why carry them. The wax box will heat a cup of coffee nicely. A 'D' bar is always a good thing to carry in case of an emergency. Carry your rations in the most

convenient place. They can cause a lot of grief

during a long march."

### FIFTH ARMY AT THE WINTER LINE 15 November 1943 - 15 January 1944

Center of Military History, Pub CMH 100-9, pp. 87-89 "Mud, Mules, and Mountains"

Winter (1943-1944) in the mountains greatly aided the enemy's determined efforts to delay the Allied advance. The miserable weather increased the discomfort of the men and more than doubled the disease total. At night the temperature frequently dropped below freezing; the rain changed to sleet or snow; and often the only shelters were those which the men dug in on the rocky hillsides when tactical operations permitted. To counteract these hardships our command took measures to protect health and maintain morale. Wool underwear had been issued early in November, and extra blankets and shelter-halves were available in the early part of December. Even more useful were the two-piece combat suits with

go with the men's 'K' or 'C' rations, whatever it might be. It builds up their morale and tells them that their kitchen crew is thinking of them and not sitting on their beds."

### T-4 ALEX G. BLACK. 133rd Infantry:

"A better ration should be given the fighting ration when they are able to get a hot meal instead of the usual hash or stew menus. Pork and gravy or beef and gravy takes no more time to prepare and is much better."

### S/Sgt. DELBERT F. LEET, 133rd Infantry:

"When bringing rations up to the company always be sure not to bring fire down on the area, or in the vicinity of the company, by pulling in too fast with the vehicles. Always pick a secluded spot where the enemy cannot observe your movement."

### PFC WILLIAM E. WOODROW, 135th Infantry:

"The infantry soldier when going on an attack, usually carries either 'C' rations or 'K' rations, and sometimes a combination of the two.
As for the 'C' ration all I can say is experiment on different ways of carrying them. I've found that three units fit nicely in a combat pack. As for the 'K' ration, I suggest you open the boxes and break the contents down. There ma

which many front-line units were equipped. By December the men also had overshoes, and the battalion surgeons ordered the aid stations to ke supply of dry socks. A double coffee allowance was issued, and wherever possible hot meals took place of the "K" or "10-in-1" ration.

Despite these efforts, the cold and wet weather and loss of sleep during weeks of continual fighting contributed to the great amount of sickness among the troops. Disease removed far more men from combat units than did enemy action. During December, a month when unusually heavy fighting took place, 5,020 Fifth Army men were wounded, but the total of admissions to hospitals and quarters was 22,816. Jaundice, fevers, and trench foot were prevalent.

The institution of Fifth Army Rest Camps at Naples was perhaps the most successful step toward maintaining high morale. Men received new uniforms; hot showers were always available, and hot food was served at any hour. There were movies and band concerts daily, and soldiers were completely on their own so long as they maintained good behavior. From the end of Nov 44' on, divisions sent about three thousand men to the rear every five days so that in little more than a month the entire personnel would have a five-day rest.



The 34th Infantry Division Association was originated in 1946 by the senior officers and commanders of the of 34th Infantry Division to commemorate, associate, and continue the recognition of the soldiers and units of the National Guard that sacrificed their lives, gave the time to serve and dedicate their bravery for the protection of peoples around the world. The Association, at the time of establishment had veterans from every corner of the United States and still does. We continue to have these veterans as members. This includes Hawaii.

We have annual reunions every year at different locations.

The Reunions are held the First weekend after Labor Day in September.

### NATIONAL ASSOCIATION AND LOCAL CHAPTERS

The Association established a National Association and installed in the Constitution that there could be local chapters throughout the United States so that a collection of members, locally, could hold meetings so that they could keep the memories alive, exchange stories, establish lasting friendships, Record the history of the 34th Infantry Division to be on file for any and everyone who is interested in reviewing the records of the Division.

### **MEMBERSHIP**

This Division, in World War II has the distinction of being the FIRST to land in the European Theater, and also had more days in Combat (over 600) than any other, and was accredited with capturing more than 40,000 enemy soldiers.
